THE CZAR'S VICEROY HOUDAY ILLS ARE

VICE ADMIRAL ALEXEIEFF, THE RULER OF EASTERN ASIA.

ussia's Commander in Manchuria Who Mas Been Vested With Extraordinary Powers-Mighty Forces at Mis Command-A Strong Man Who Has Rison

Perhaps the Czar's most favored Perhaps the Czar's most favored and powerful lieutenant is Vice-Admiral Alexeiefi, who was recently appointed viceroy of Russia in the fareast, with powers transcending any hitherto given to a representative of the Czar, and his forceful personality has been of almost paramount importance in the recent events in eastern Asia.

When the great Emparor of the

portance in the recent events in eastern Asia.

When the great Emperor of the morth by Imperial ukase a few months ago created the Amur district and the Kwangtung territory, or Russian Manchuria, a special vice-coyalty it was taken as an indication that Russia did not intend to loosen her grip on Manchuria. This forecast seems now to have been proved by the reoccupation of Mukden by Russian troops and by well authenticated reports that Russia is to remain in Manchuria, allowing Japan to have her way with Korsa. Vice-Admiral Alexeieff, aid-de-camp general to the Czar, who was appointed administrator of the vice-royalty, has for some time been commander-in-chief of the Russian troops in Manchuria and of the Russian maval forces in the far east, and his new office wests him as well with supreme authority ever all branches of the civil administration. A special committee under the presidency of the Czar sees that Alexeieff's policy is in keeping with that of the Empire.

The new viceroy, whom the Czar has delighted to honor on several previous occasions, has already done much valuable work for his country



spent by Russia at Vladivostok on new docks, wharfs and barracks for thousands of men. In all of this de-velopment Alexeich has been the guiding spirit, and it is to him that Russia looks for carrying on its looks for carrying on its policy in eastern Asia.

He has already established a re-

The northern portion, little known until recently, has been thoroughly explored by the Russians and is now traversed by the Transmanchurian railway. The great rivers of the country, the Yalu and Sungari, are navigable for hundreds of miles, and along them diving the recent navigable for hundreds of miles, and along them during the open season fleets of Chinese and Japanese junks ply between cities of the two countries. In spite of its great population Manchuria possesses few large cities, much of the country retaining its primeral wildness.

The little corner one-storey cottage in Moodoe street, where the iron millionaire was born, is still as it was sixty years ago—a substantial stone-built weaver's cottage, the like of which are found anywhere in the County (or Kingdom) of Fife-for years seem to make little impression on the gray walls and dull-colored roof states. There his fa her ran four damask handlooms, and employed approntices. Steam weaving destroyed the handloom industry, and when Mr. Carnegie was 10 years old the whole family emigrated to America.

Mr. Carnegie has been prodigal with his birth town—or, rather, city, for Dunfermline has an abbey and was a King's residence, so is called a city. He has given a free library, a magnificent bath, a splendid equipped technical institute, fountains and band-stands, stained windows for the abbey and other endownments too numerous to mention.

But his latest benefaction has surprised even the long-headed Fifers; and it takes a good deal to upset a Fifer. Pittencrieff Park and Glen and House and Gardens, with \$2,500,000 in 5 per cent. Steel boads to keep it up! o keep it up! Pittencrief Glen is certainly very

Mr. Carnegie wants the trustees to whom he hands over the estate and the \$2.500,000 to strike out something new, to use the money "in attempts to bring into the monotonous lives of the toiling masses of Dunfermline more of sweetness and light."

Mr. Carnegie has offcred £10,000 Mr. Carnegie has offered £10,000 for the erection of four small branch libraries in Bournemouth, to replace the present rented quarters, and to give a library to Winton, on the understanding that a library rate of not less than £1,000 annually shall be raised, and that the sites for four branches shall be previded free of costs to the rates.

The Teddington Council on Monday received and accepted an effer of £4,-000 from Mr. Carnegie to build a free library. It was decided that the present library premises should be given up, and a new library erected near the Council offices on town property. This is the fourth Carnegie gift to the Thames Valley.




