

BODY OF MAN PICKED UP

Believed to be that of Engineer William Watts who was washed off the tug S. O. Dixon, in terrific gale of ducks on Sept. 15th.

The body of one of the men found off Duck Island, is believed to be that of William Watts, who was employed as engineer on the tug S. O. Dixon, and who was washed overboard of this tug about five miles from the Ducks, during a terrific windstorm at three o'clock on Sunday morning, Sept. 15th.

Mr. Watts was sixty-one years of age, six feet in height, with gray hair and mustache, slight build, and weighing about 155 or 160 pounds.

The tug Dixon, with the barges Louisa and Iselwild, loaded with molasses, and bound for Belleville, from Oswego, encountered a heavy wind storm, when a few hours out of Oswego, the storm developed into a hurricane.

While returning from the firehold to the engine-room, he was washed overboard. Joseph Williams, of Oswego, the fireman, saw him toppling over when the tug gave a lurch.

Capt. William Zeim, of Detroit, was in command of the vessel. He was in the pilot house at the time of the accident, and when he heard Williams calling for help he rushed to the engine-room and shut off the power.

Life boats were lowered, and search was continued till daylight. There was no person on the tug who could look after the engine, and the captain did what he could, but when it was found that power could not be kept up, the steam engine was halted, and the tug and the barges were towed to Kingston—Kingston Wharf.

Master John T. Crozier, son of Mr. T. H. Crozier, 55 Alexander St., received a tribute to his bravery in the form of the medal of the Royal Humane Society for saving from drowning W. B. Kelly, a boy of like years, at Lake Chemong last July.
