slightest provocation. Once when she could not fudge with him he said: "Very well, I will go and change my will." Afterward, however, he said: "You little rascal; you know I would never do that."
Witness emphatically denied that she and her daughter had secretly visited Scott's house and examined the documents there as had been stated by Major Arbutnot, in his evidence. Under cross-examination Lady Sackville said she and her husband had about \$15,000 a year. When she met Scott, they were not in debt but they were in difficulties. From 1897 he was generally \$5,000 behind each year and was unhappy over his family affairs and the behaviour of his brothers and sisters.

Paris News

Paris, July 3rd, 1913.
London Asylum vs. Paris.
The holiday and fine weather brought a bunch of Paris supporters, to the number of close on forty, to London on Tuesday to witness this game.
Wickets were pitched at 11:30 a.m. Paris batted first, England and Thompson facing the bowling of May and Evans.
England opened auspiciously for his side, putting the second ball of the interval, and splendidly for four. With the addition of a single run to the score, however, Thompson was caught and bowled by Evans.
The Paris batting here fell to pieces. Four wickets falling in quick succession with but a few runs added; the telegraph reading after a half hour's play—25 5 0.
L. Drake and A. Bee stopped the rout and batted steadily until the lunch interval, the score then being 50. Resuming after lunch Bee scored off May's bowling. In the next over Drake was well bowled by Thompson after playing steadily for 45 minutes, getting 18 runs in that time—51 6 8 2.
Bee was out lb.w. to May shortly afterwards, after scoring 24 in excellent fashion—69 7 24.
With the addition of 12 runs to the score 11 of them obtained by Therman, the innings closed.
The Londoners opened against the bowling of Bee and Therman.
Spectacular fielding by Bee caused the downfall of three of the best bats of the London team, Evans, who scored 167 against Chatham a few weeks ago, Richardson and Thompson being the victims.
With the exception of Bee the Paris trundlers were far from effective against the opposing batsmen and the Cockneys ran up the respectable total of 140 before they were all dismissed.
The Londoners claimed 49-3.
The Paris fielding was admirable on all hands, one of the resident medical officials of the asylum declaring it had seen for a number of seasons past—and that despite the heat.
