## ASSAULT-AT-ARMS MUCH ENJOYED

Large Crowd Saw Good Events at the Opera House.

## BOXING AND SPARRING BOUTS

125th Seemed to Have Shade on 84th During the Evening.

The assault-at-arms, given under the auspices of the 125th Brant Battalion Athletic Association last evening in the opera house proved most successful affair, and despite the inclemency of the weather, a large crowd assembled to witness the performance, large numbers of soldiers from both the 84th and 125th being in evidence. During the early part of the program, an unfortunate accident occurred, the placed being plunged in darkness through the failure of the lights of the Western Counties Co. However, after a wait of some fifteen minutes, the lights came on again and the program proceeded. The 125th B. band, under Bandmaster Bartman, rendered several choice selections, which kept the crowd in good humor.

The first item on the program was a boxing bout in the 135 pound class, between Pte. Hall of the 84th, and Pte. Heatley of the 125th. The bout was staged for three rounds of one minute each, and was finally awarded to Pte. Heatley, he having the best of the argument all the way through.

The next was a sparring bout between Pte. Downs, 125th B. and Pte. Brantford of the 84th B. In the 115 pound class. This number proved very good, both men showing much skill in their work. The honors, however, again fell to the 125th, Pte. Downs being declared the winner.

In the 135 pound class, Pte. Holmes of the 84th and Pte. Solderstrom put up a great argument, and furnished lots of sport for those present in the manly and scientific art of boxing, and were loudly applauded for their efforts.

It was at this juncture that the lights went out, but on their resumption, bayonet exercises were the next feature on the program. The different contestants all showed more or less in the handling of the bayonet, and some very exciting passage at arms resulted.

Two more boxing bouts were then staged, one in the 125 pound class and the other in the 135 pound. The last named class was, perhaps, the best of the evening, and was between Corp. Morgan of the 84th and Pte. Sims of the 125th. Both men were fairly evenly matched, although Sims had slight advantage, but he was outwitted by Morgan, who was finally declared the winner.

The 125th seemed to be able to capture most of the events from the 84th, although, as a rule their men were not so heavy.

Referee Sully gave entire satisfaction during the evening, except in one instance, when he called a foul on one of the boxers. In this the majority of the crowd did not agree, otherwise he gave perfect satisfaction.

As a result, a nice little sum will be realized to help the athletic association of the battalion in providing outdoor sports during their summer camp.

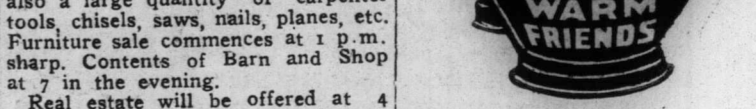
