Supt. Austin, of the mechanical department of the L. E. & D. R. R., has fitted out engine No. 18, purchased from the Mississippi & Hamburg Railway, in Arkansas, for a trial trip. It will be used on the London & Port Stanley division in hauling coal.

Ex-Adm. Carpenter says the rumor has got abroad that he is going to move away from the city, and friends persist in shaking hands and bidding him goodbye. He doesn't intend leaving Chatham just yet.

A resident of the county came into the Planet yesterday and tendered a dollar bill without any explanation. On being pressed for a reason for the payment he finally stated that about ten years ago the Planet had overpaid him by a dollar and he wished to refund the amount.

The members of the St. Thomas city and Egin county councils have been invited by the Lake Erie & Detroit River Railway to take a trip to Cleveland on the steamer Urania. ACCUSED OF SEDUCTION.

Before W. R. Hickey and Jonas Gosnell, justices of the peace, at Harrison, yesterday afternoon, a young Raleigh farmer was arraigned on the information of John Sewell, charged with the seduction of Annie Sewell. He was remanded for a week, bail being granted. J. A. Walker for the prosecution. W. S. Richards for the defense. Frank Toulouse, of Mitchell's Bay, failed to appear on an information charging him with using insulting language to Mrs. Hugh Allen, and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

OTTAWA'S OLDEST BANKER.

Speaking of the death of H. V. Noel, one of Mr. H. L. Bray, of this city, an Ottawa despatch says:—The capital has lost one of its foremost citizens in the person of Mr. H. V. Noel, late local manager of the Quebec Bank, who died last night at the ripe old age of 86. Mr. Noel, who was a native of the Island of Jersey, came to Canada in 1828, and took up his residence here in 1833, when Colonel By was engaged in the construction of the Rideau canal. Subsequently he removed to Quebec, but in 1853 was commissioned to open in Ottawa (now Ottawa) an agency of the Quebec Bank. For nearly fifty years he held the position of manager of that institution in politics, and collected with many financial and charitable institutions. He was one of the founders of the St. George's Society of Ottawa, and president of that body for many years. His flag are flying at half mast over the Rideau Club and Quebec Bank to the memory of the deceased.

HOW CHATHAM STRIKES REV. MR. RANNIE.

The Rev. John Rannie, of Georgetown, whose return from British Guiana has already been mentioned, is visiting his brother in this city. The climate of British Guiana, he said, was very different from what he had in Chatham. Mr. Rannie will sail on the Vancouver for Aberdeen, Scotland, where Mrs. Rannie and the family now are. On Tuesday night the local lodge, L. O. O. F., will give Mr. Rannie a grand send-off.

ELEPHANT HANGED.

Derriek and Rope Ended Injured Animal's Suffering.

Baltimore, June 9.—"Sport," the elephant belonging to Dr. Wick's menagerie of wild animals, which are exhibiting here, was killed last night by hanging. "Sport" was injured in a railroad accident several weeks ago, and to end his misery it was deemed best to kill him. A rope attached to a derriek was made fast about the neck of the two-ton beast last night and he was strangled six minutes after his body left the car in which he had been nursed.
