## THE MARKETS

CHATHAM GRAIN MARKET.

Planet Office, Tuesday evening, April 23.  
J. B. Stringer, of J. B. Stringer & Co., gives The Planet the following grain gossip.

Wheat—None coming in. Market is firm on account of light receipts, and a stronger western market. The growing crop is doing well.

Corn—Quite a large quantity showing up daily, and the market is stronger in west it has no effect on the Canadian market, owing to jobbers not making the demands they did earlier in the season. Many of the stock feeders have disposed of their animals and now do not require the corn. This is the reason of the slack demand. Prices are about a cent less at 30c, except for seed varieties, which bring a cent or two more.

Oats—Market is about the same as last week. Anything selling above 29 cents is for local use. Export value won't allow any more than 29 cents. Receipts light.

Beans—Market lifeless, no demand and no receipts. One dollar to \$1.10 is being paid for beans.  
Barley—Very little left in country. Fair demand for export and feeding purposes. We have nothing that will grade No. 3 extra here, values are for feed only at 75c. to 80c. per cwt.

**TORONTO BEAN MARKET.**  
Toronto, April 23.—Beans—Ordinary white beans bring \$1.55 to \$1.60; choice handpicked beans are quoted at \$1.65 to \$1.70.

**TORONTO DRESSED HOGS.**  
Toronto, April 23.—Dressed hogs on the street are firm at \$8.25 to \$8.75. Car lots continue scarce, and are quoted nominally at \$8 to \$8.25, on track here.

**TORONTO GRAIN MARKET.**  
Toronto, April 23.—Owing to the good decrease in the visible and stocks on passage, the Chicago market was strong. Local prices had a firm tone, but were no higher. Quotations are as follows:—Red wheat, 67c; white wheat 67c; No. 1 goose wheat 66c; low freight to New York; red and white, 66c; middle freight, for Portland; Manitoba No. 1, hard, g. l. i.; 95c; No. 2, 94c; No. 1 hard, North Bay, 94c; and No. 2 hard, 90c.

Millfeed—Tone easy. Ton lots at the mill door, Western Ontario points, sell as follows:—Bran, \$14; and shorts, \$15.  
Corn—American yellow, on track, here, 47 1-2c; No. 3, 46 1-2c.  
Peas—Steady. No. 2, middle freight at 65c.; and east at 65 1-2c.  
Barley—Getting scarce. Crop pretty cut. Prices continue firm. No. 2, east freight, \$45 1-2c; No. 3 extra, same freight, 44 1-2c; cargoes No. 2 lake front, at 44c to 45 1-2c.  
Buckwheat—Firm and scarce. Car lots west, are quoted at 52c; and east at 54c.

Oats—Strong. No. 1 white oats on the midland, 30 1-2c. No. 1, white, west, are quoted at 30c.  
Rye—Steady. Car lots, 49c west, and 50c east.  
Flour—Firm. Holders of 90 per cent. patents, buyers' terms, middle freight, as \$2.60 per bbl. Exporters were bidding \$2.58.  
Oatmeal—Firm. Higher prices were quoted. Car lots of rolled oats, in bags, on track, are quoted at \$3.25 per bbl., and in wood, at \$3.35.

THE MAN FROM MEXICO.

"The Man From Mexico," made such a pronounced hit in Canada last fall that the present tour was arranged solely for the purpose of filling some return dates. It played Guelph Nov. 4 and the Herald said the next day:—

"The management of the Guelph Opera House promised the patrons a rare treat Saturday night in 'The Man From Mexico,' and they got it in full measure. A brighter, catchier, or more cleverly conceived comedy has never been played on a local stage. It completely delighted the audience, and that being the chief aim of such a play, should place it in a high class. Charles H. Perkins, the leading man, had wit enough to take a whole show. His humor was perfectly natural and continuously effective. Mr. Perkins assumed the character of Ben. Fitzgaw, the man from Mexico. His revelries with his bosom companion Col.
