#### The Transient Traders' case.

In the case of the Chief Constable against Brunton, His Worship delivered judgment this morning. It will be remembered that defendant, an outsider, was charged with selling Japaness fancy goodswithout a transient trader's license. The P. M. held that defendant having taken lease of premises from Mr. Martin. having got his name on the Assessment Roll, and having taken out auctioneer's license had done all that he considered necessary to comply with our law. He thought the defendant had acted in good faith and intended to carry out the law as far as he understood it. The offence against the defendant being of a oriminal nature, there should be a wrong intention in the mind of the offender before conviction. He thought that there was no intention on the part of this defendant to offend, and that, therefore, if he had broken the letter of the law in this instance he should not be convicted. He accordingly dramissed the case without costs. The returns began to come in to the city hall about 5.30, and by six o'clock it was pretty generally known who were the fortunate men who

and secured the seats. In St. Patrick's Mr. Thos. Pepper, the new candidate, got to the top of the poll, Mr. J. Kennedy retains his seat while Mr. D. Coffee managed to secure the position held by Mr. T. P. Coffee last year by a majority of six votes over Ald. Hatch, who is thereby shut out. It is a matter of regret that Mr. Hatch should have been left at home, as he has done good service to the city on the railway board this past year and is an efficient and capable alderman.

year and is an efficioient and capable alderman.

Another case of apparent ingratitude on the part of the electors is the defeat of Ald. Husband in St. George's ward. No man in the Council has given more time to the furtherance of the city's railway matters than has Mr. Husband, and the interests of the ward and diy have had faithful attention as his hands. His defeat may be attributed in part to the feeling against him in connection with the G. J. Railway crossings in St. George's Ward, for which he can hardly be held responsible. Mr. Klopfer's election at the head of the poll by such a majority is an expression of the public confidence in him as a successful and energetic business man. The race between the old members, Messrs. Hamilton, Howard and Husband was very close, the latter being only a vote behind. Mr. D. Spragge's very fair showing no doubt affected the result materially.

In St. John's Mr. Chas. Walker, jr., at the head of the poll, replaces Ald. Carter, while Ald. Read, in spite of the dead set made against him in some quarters, is returned without an effort. Ald. Kilgour heads Mr. S. Dawson by two votes, while Meesrs. Carter, Moore and Crosbie made a close run.
