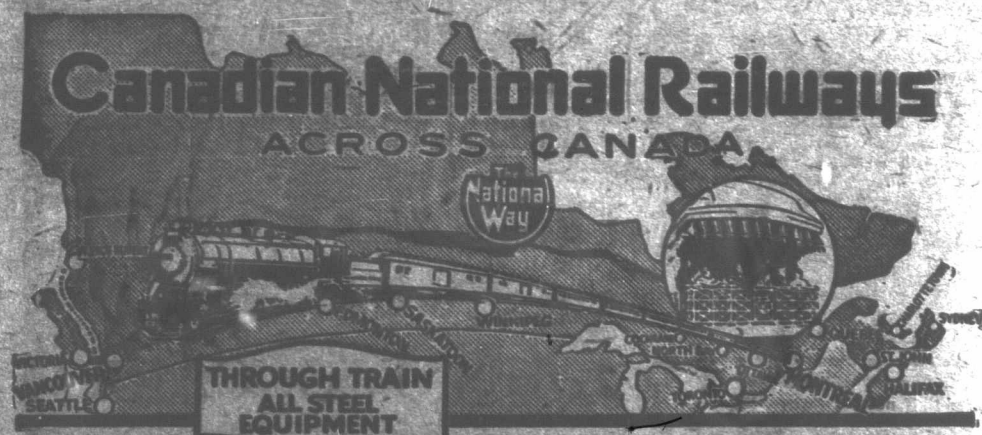
Malcolm Woodland, returned on Saturday from visiting relatives at Upper Kent.

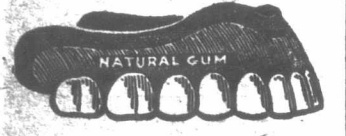
