## POSTMASTERS' SALARIES.

Large Delegation Interviewed Postmaster General With Regard to Increase.

Some of the Principal Recommendations Which Are Being Strongly Advocated.

ASK MINIMUM PAY OF \$50.

OTTAWA, April 11.—A deputation of Canadian postmasters waited on the postmaster general today in the interest of postmasters of the dominion with a request for remuneration and were promised full consideration of the claims they put forward.

The bill of particulars presented by the postmasters contained nine items. They asked in the first place that the minimum wage be raised from \$25 to \$50 and that when the pay is determined on the percentage basis the following scale be adopted:

Sixty per cent. on stamps sales up to \$1,000 yearly, forty per cent. on sales between that and \$5,000 and thirty per cent. on sales from that to \$10,000.

The other requests were for a ten per cent. allowance for rent, fuel and light; that an allowance be paid for service before eight and after seven p. m.; that the post office department furnish stationery for the local postmasters; that newspaper publishers be compelled to fold copies of their papers so as to admit of easy sorting; that the money order system be further simplified; that in the savings bank department interest be allowed from date of deposit to actual date of withdrawal; that a postal stores depot be established at Winnipeg for the convenience of the west; that postmasters be allowed to take advantage of the cheap government insurance now provided for civil servants; that a better quality of paper be used in postage stamps and that circulars, etc., mailed in a wholesale manner be not allowed to leave the office of mailing until securely tied in bundles ready for forwarding to the different offices; that a basis of remuneration be established for postmasters in towns where the work has largely increased by the establishment of customs ports of entry and that salaries be provided for all accounting offices.

The deputation was introduced by H. J. Logan, M. P., and was supported by several other members of parliament. Their speaker was Ira Stratton, of Stonewall, Manitoba; James Scott, of Clifton (Ont.), and B. W. Ralston, of Amherst.

Captain Lewis, M. P. for Huron, appealed to the postmaster general to use a portion of the surplus to increase the postmasters' pay.

In reply Hon. Mr. Alesworth promised to consider whether he would use the surplus of the surplus to increase the postmasters' pay or to give a more frequent mail service to the rural parts of the country.

### INFANTICIDE CASE

Newcastle Perturbed Over Disappearance of a Child Late Born There.

NEWCASTLE, N. B., April 11.—A serious case of alleged infanticide was reported by the police this morning. A short time ago Rachel Preston became the mother of what would appear to be an illegitimate child. A few days ago the infant was reported missing, but nothing serious was thought of it, as it is not uncommon for children of this type to be handed over by the mother to the Indians to be cared for. The case was reported to the police, however, and this morning Officer Galt went in search and found the remains of an infant in a heap of dirt near the house of Rachel's father. The coroner was immediately notified and later the remains were removed to Mr. May's undertaking parlor. Dr. Desmond at once decided to hold an inquest and a coroner's jury was summoned and sworn. The investigation was then adjourned until Wednesday at 3 o'clock p. m., to take place at the police court in the town hall. In the meantime doctors will examine the remains. For the past few days Rachel is reported to have been in hiding, but today she is visible and a warrant has been issued for her arrest.

### SCHOONER LOST.

Four of the Crew Lose Their Lives After a Hard Struggle.

BOSTON, April 11.—The Bangor schooner Sallie B., with four of her crew, was included in the toll exacted from the coasting fleet by the storm of Monday night and yesterday. Fifteen minutes after the little vessel plunged beneath the waves off the Maine coast yesterday forenoon a gigantic billow swept three of the six men from the long boat into which they had all hastily jumped, while the fourth victim died in the boat from exposure seven hours later.

The two survivors, Captain A. L. Hopkins of Brewer, Me., and John Mulhain, a native of Finland, who shipped in New York, were picked up by the forenoon off Cape Porpoise by the Portland steamer Bay State and landed here early this evening in a pitiable plight.

### THE ROSS RIFLE.

QUEBEC, April 11.—In conducting experiments on the Covefield with a new cartridge adapted to the Ross rifle some remarkable results have been obtained. A muzzle velocity of 2,735 feet per second was obtained as compared with a velocity of 2,000 feet per second given by the present service ammunition. The tremendous advantage this new cartridge will give to troops provided with it is so great that it is difficult for the mind to grasp. It makes it possible for a fixed sight to be used up to a 700-yard range.
