BANQUET FOR LAURIER AT WORCESTER.

Reports From the Dominion Experi-  
mental Farm.

OTTAWA, July 5.—The last meeting of  
the Agriculture Committee for this session  
was held to-day, when the annual report  
was prepared and will be submitted to Par-  
liament this afternoon. It shows that Mr.  
Saunders, director of the Experimental  
Farm, was the first witness this year. "His  
evidence was to the effect that over  
thirteen tons of samples of seed grain  
had been distributed in answer  
to applications from all parts of the Do-  
minion. The evidence of Mr. W. Robert-  
son, Dairy Commissioner, pointed to the  
fact that as a result of winter butter-  
making, the exported product would  
reach 85,000,000, more than 100,000,000  
return of which would be in cash to farm-  
ers. Mr. James Fletcher, the Dominion  
entomologist, Mr. John Craig, horticultur-  
ist, and Mr. Stuart, chemist, also gave  
valuable evidence before the Commis-  
sion. Mr. Lowe, Deputy of the Agriculture  
Department, and Mr. A. M. Burgess were  
each examined in regard to immigration.  
The latter testified by utilizing the  
Dominion Land officers as immigration  
agents a saving of \$27,000 or thereabout  
was accomplished.

WILL HAVE A HUNDRED.

Yesterday's Voting gives Promise of a Big  
Gladstonian Majority.

BROADHURST AND BEN TILLET DEFEATED.

New York, July 5.—The Times London  
special says: The first day's engagement  
in the great election contest did not go off  
quite so well as the more sanguine ex-  
pected. Out of fifty-eight boroughs re-  
ported, the Liberals show a net gain of  
eight. The proportion would give a gain  
of some forty borough seats in the whole  
kingdom, but the boroughs are not the true  
field for the test of the Liberals strength.

**On the other hand,** the more agitated  
provincial towns, and even more in  
London. The Liberal gains and losses  
in yesterday's fight give little in-  
dication as to the feeling in  
the nation. They won seats in the four  
ecclesiastical boroughs of Durham, Here-  
ford, Lincoln and Reading. They lost  
heavily in the Episcopal town of Rochester.  
On the other hand, they won in the two  
factories of Bradford and Stockport,  
but lost in an unexpected fashion, in York  
and Nottingham. This last place is the  
only one where the eight-hour agitation  
which at one time threatened such dire  
mischiefs to the Liberals, has done any  
harm.

**Here Broadhurst,** who was one of  
the most meting of the erstwhile Labor  
members, has been defeated by the candi-  
date of the more advanced workman  
candidate, standing on a night-hour platform.  
Ben Tillet failed, however, to resist  
Illingworth in Bradford. Of other pro-  
vincial contests, the most interesting was  
at Greenock, where Sir Thomas  
Sutherland, President of the Peninsular &  
Oriental Steam Line, and a leading  
Liberal Unionist of Scotland has been  
defeated.

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
