Never a friend of Cecil Rhodes and those mining magnates who engineered the Boer war, he does not spare them his righteous anger in his book. and he describes how false news was "manufactured" in order to lead the people at home to think that the Boers were England's implacable enemies: "I got an early hint about the manner in which the preparation of the telegraphic information was manufactured for transmission on Sunday evenings to London for the Monday morning papers by the inner circle of the "Constitutionalists," in their mansion near Capetown. One of the leading spirits assembled at the supper board held the pen on these occasions; the guests added their varying sparks of imaginative composition; and from these there would be compiled some bits of sensational news, the final reading of which would be the signal for uproarious applause from the other members present."
