## James Eales Cut Rotary Engine Near the Round House.

At 12.15 p.m. to-day James Eales a workman in the machine shops of the Reid Nfld. Co., met with a hor-rible death near the round house. The victim is 42 years of age, married an has a wife and six children residing on Alexander Street in the West End. For several years he has worked in the employ. The story as told by an eye-witness was most harrowing. Eales was engaged working on top of the greery player on speed the last of the rotary plow on some of the last nuts before she went over the road. The man's position in working was in close proximity to the revolving fans abreast of the plow, but everything was stationary until some one gave the order to back up the engine for water. At the same time the rotary was started as well, and the rapidly revolving fans, which are as sharp a knives, struck the man, whirled hin around, and cut his body into pieces Death was instantaneous and tor ragments of the flesh were throw out through the aperatures on the top of the rotary and strewn around the yard. When the mechanism was stopped pieces of the man's flesh were picked up several yards away, and parts of the organs of the body were scattered about.
