Old Seals Seen. When the Fogota was going up Conception Bay yesterday, when off Broad Cove, several old seals—beaters—were seen on the ice and in the water. Messrs. E. St. Hill and E. Templeman who were on board with several of the crew went on the ice with bats and gaffs, but the old seals were too wary and escaped. Had they been on board they could have shot several. A great many old seals have been seen in the neighbourhood the past few days. The ice is very heavy—some of the pans being 9 feet thick.

OLD RESIDENT DEAD.—Mr. John Lockyer, one of the oldest residents of Bay de Verde died there a few days ago. He was 78 years old. The deceased leaves a son and daughter to mourn him.

Marine News. The S. S. Rosalind was supposed to have left to-day for here but in word of her going was received by the agents. The Rosina, Capt. Dillon, arrived at Bahia yesterday after a run of 49 days, all well. The schr. Evelyn which has been 8 or 10 days on the coast and which was going to the ice in the Blood-bound, and he lost all his clothes in the fire. The house was uninsured.

Returned Home. Between 50 and 60 men who were travelling to catch the train at Avondale a couple of days ago, on finding at Avondale that the Gulf ships in which they had berths had settled from St. John's, returned to their homes at Lance Cove and different parts of the North Shore. On the journey home some of them were badly frostbitten about the hands, feet and ears.

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
