Great Damage By the Storm.

great havoc in various parts of the city and suburbs and was the worst recorded for several years.

The train from Placentia did not arrive here until 12.30 a.m. to-day, and her passengers say that they never saw anything like the rain which fell as they came through. It descended in sheets of water, and just below Browning's Bridge the ballasting un-der the ties was washed away and the passengers had to leave the cars there as it was unsafe for the engine to pass over it. Agang of men worked at the place all night. The water in various places crossed the South Side Road in a river several feet deep; the waters above Browning's Bridge became miniature Niagaras, and the people of the little old style houses on the South Side of the structure got ready to leave them. Had the rain continued an hour longer these buildings would have been swept down stream and out

into the harbour.

At Placentia the rivers and pools were abnormally swollen, and the oldest residents never before saw such

From the King's Bridge down to the head of Quidi Vidi Lake a new lake has been formed and all the crops of turnips, oats, hay, cabbage, etc., owned by Mr. Robert Cole and others have been completely inundated and destroyed. Quidi Vidi Lake rose sever ai feet in a couple of hours, and al the wharves opposite the boat houses were several feet under water this On the South Side much damage en

sved. All the houses in the track of the torrents which poured off the hills were badly flooded. Tons of water re badly flooded. Tons of water ured into them at the rear; chairs, ables and other furniture floatd about in the basement kitchens, and tons o silt, sand and mud were left on the floors when the flood subsided. Several small bridges were carried away Hundreds of tons of clay and rocks were hurled against the rear of Mr Patrick Horan's residence, when par of the hill above it gave way the back part of the house beaten in and a riv er ran from the back to the front of the building for hours. Tons of earth rock, etc., were scattered about the floors and the furniture and effects were badly damaged. Mr. E. Coyle's residence near suffered similarly. trying to clear the debris in front his house Mr. Coyle had a narrow escape. A river about 4 feet deep ra across the road very swiftly into the waters above the Long Bridge an these swept under the parapets of the Bridge into the waters of the harbo like a mill race. Mr. Coyle was swer off his legs and would have been tak en out into the harbour but that h was grasped by a bystander and drawn to safety. Skeletons Kept Vigil

On Wrecked Steamer Since 1865. Alpena, Mich., July 20 .- Forty-sever years ago the steamer Pewabic foundered in Thunder Bay, Lake Superior with a loss of one hundred and forty lives and carried down with her cargo of pure lake copper. Yesterday a diver encased in a new deep sea working device known as the 'Iron Man," descended one hundred and sixty feet and trod the Pewabic's decks while on all sides of him grinning skeletons kept vigil as they have done since that awful night in 1865 As the diver worked below, the steamer Nelson Bloom, sister ship of the Pewabic, and a vessel with which the Pewabic collided, passed by short distance away, saluting the wreckers as she moved.

The Storm.

Last night's south east gale and rain storm was severely felt in the city. There was a very heavy under-tow in the harbour, and along the waterfront shipping were pounding heavily against the different piers. The S. S. Stephano had to be removed from the wharf to prevent damage being done.

A few schooners broke their moor-ings and drifted down the harbour and it was only after considerable diffi-culty they were anchored securely. A terrific sea was running at the North and South Batteries and stages and fishing gear were threatened with destruction. Most of the residents were up the greater part of the night taking in their boats and protecting their property from being destroyed. In this connection it is expected that havoc was wrought around the coast and the extent of the damages will be known in a day or so.

In the city it rained hard and incessant, while the wind was at a high point. Streets were inundated, gui-leys and drains became choked and some of the Council's men were up all night making repairs.


