Cable News.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Officials of the Treasury Department are at sea to know what Congress actually meant by the provision in the new tariff law allowing five per cent. reduction of duties on goods imported in American ships with the condition that differential should not be construed to abrogate or impair any existing treaty between the States and foreign nations. Lit-provision should give five per cent. decrease on goods imported in American bottoms and automatically grant the same privilege to ships of many nations whose treaties with the States guarantee no discrimination between their vessels and those of this country. The question undoubtedly will be referred to President Wilson and Attorney General McReynolds, and ultimately will reach the States Supreme Court State and Treasury Departments, who are in consultation over the effect. Countries which will be charged full Underwood duties in any event, are Brazil, Chile, China, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, France, German Empire, except several German States, Nicaragua, Panama, Persia, Peru, Portugal, Russia, Salvador, Sierr Leone, Switzerland, Turkey, Uruguay and Venezuela; also the treaty with Britain does not guarantee equal treatment for vessels in her colonies such as Canada and Australia.

OTTAWA, To-day. The new United States tariff has been compared with schedules of reciprocity agreement by a well-known Tariff authority of Ottawa, and results in the complete justification of the stand taken by the conservative in 1911. The articles free by the final draft of the new United States Tariff are, cattle, swine, sheep and lambs; 17½ bushels wheat, corn, fresh milk, fresh cream, eggs, grass seeds, oysters, lobsters, shrimps and other shellfish; buckwheat, sorghum, flaxseed, barbed wire, extract of hemlock, bark, cream separators, type-setting machines, coke, timber hewn, square or sided, sawed boards, planks, deals and other lumber, pickets and other wooden staves; wheat will be free if Canada removes the duty on wheat, wheat flour and other wheat products, otherwise the duty will be ten per cent. instead of 25 cents per bushel; potatoes will be free if Canada removes the duty, otherwise 10 per cent. instead of 25 cents per bushel will be levied.

OTTAWA, To-day. Cordial greetings have just passed between Borden and the First Minister of Australian Commonwealth, Hon. Joseph Cook, on the completion of the battleship Australia and the cruiser Sydney, the Canadian Premier called as follows:—"The Government on behalf of the people of Canada tender their congratulations on the occasion of official reception of the battleship Australia and the cruiser Sydney. He assured Canada will stand shoulder to shoulder with Australia and other overseas Dominions in the firm resolve to safeguard our common heritage." Premier Cook's reply contained the same strong note of imperial unity and cordial thanks. It ran: "For kind congratulations heartily reciprocate brotherly speech. We are celebrating to-day the completion of an Australian unit of Empire peace, compelling the Navy gladly sharing the obligation for the defense of the whole King's Dominions, this spirit with which we greet our Canadian brothers may cement Empire and set even more firmly as our navies grow."

LONDON, Oct. 6. Because clergy do not include women in their prayers, a party of suffragettes, yesterday, interrupted the morning services at Westminster Abbey by chanting prayer for women now in prison. A party rose as the Litany was being recited, ignored a request to desist singing. At the conclusion the women left the Abbey quietly, addressing a crowd outside. One of them said "this is nothing to what will happen unless women are included in clergy's prayers."

The steamer Argyle calls there every Tuesday night about 11.30, sometimes later, and leaves again the following morning (Wednesday) about 9.30, so you can imagine, Mr. Editor, what time the people have to answer any letters, especially of importance; yet there is a road (credit to no country) only eight miles from Lawn to St. Lawrence, where both the Portia and Glenoe call, and no mail man to take the mails from one settlement to another. This is disgraceful and plainly shows neglect on the part of the Government to think that a settlement like Lawn only can get a mail once a week, when other settlements get two or three. Now as the elections are drawing nigh, I have no doubt but
