Germany Planning War of Revenge -- Italy Protests Execution of Greek Ministers -- Vatican Also Will Make Definite Protest -- Newfoundland Represented at M.P.A. Gathering.

SENSATIONAL STORY.

LONDON, Nov. 30. The Germans are actively planning a war of revenge against the Allies for which purpose they have concluded a secret military agreement with Russia, is the main point of a memorandum by a person in touch with the best informed circles in Berlin and Munich, communicated to the Daily Mail. The paper claims to have made enquiries into the memorandum, and with the result, the Mail says it has been very largely confirmed. Except for preliminary details, the Mail's story does not materially differ from similar statements from time to time in anti-Germans. The memorandum contains particulars with respect to arrangements to enable Germany to utilize Russia's resources, which will make Russia's support of both herself and Germany, and says Germany will establish a base in Russia, whose armies will be supplied, and submarines will be built in Russia. The memorandum is under German guidance and is being prepared by German officers. Poland is to be given Germany and Russia a free hand. The Mail claims to have obtained the fact that five German officers are now in London carrying out the conditions of the secret agreement, that many of them have begun to receive Russian munitions, while German engineers are reconditioning the Russian ships to the Polish fronts.

DEAD AS BRAVE MEN.

ATHENS, Nov. 30. The former cabinet ministers executed Tuesday were courageous to the death. Immaculately dressed and with utmost composure they faced the execution outside the city, and smilingly led to their positions before the firing squad. Stratos lit a cigarette, took his stand, then passed the case to the officer commanding the squad as a sign of appreciation for the courtesy shown by the latter in not placing them in the front line. All chatted with one another while the firing squad were being given, and when the order to fire was given, all fell as one, death coming to each.

ITALY ALSO PROTECTS.

LONDON, Nov. 30. An exchange telegraph despatch from Rome says Premier Mussolini has planned to protest to the Italian Cabinet to-day against the execution of the Greek ministers of former public men. The protest would be on purely humanitarian grounds.

VATICAN TO PROTEST.

ROME, Nov. 30. The Vatican is to make a definite protest to the Greek Government against the execution of the former Greek Ministers.

SOPIA FEARS REPEITION OF GREEK EXECUTIONS.

SOPIA, Nov. 30. The summary execution of former members of the Greek Cabinet, has caused a sensation here where twenty-four former Government Ministers are awaiting sentence or trial under similar charges. It is feared the radical agrarians will demand the death penalty. It is believed Great Britain and other countries will sever diplomatic relations with Bulgaria if the former officials are executed.

VENEZUELOS MAY LEAVE LAUSANNE.

PARIS, Nov. 31. Venezelos, former Greek Premier, is quoted by newspapers as follows: "I deplore the tragic events which have taken place in Athens, but they are essentially a matter of interior policy and should Lord Curzon publicly stigmatize, in my presence, the acts in Athens, I should be obliged to leave Lausanne."

MORE GREEK ARRESTS.

LONDON, Nov. 30. Reuters despatch from Athens says Generals Papaulas, Dousmanis, and Valetas, have been arrested. All three were prominent officers in the Greek Army at the time of the Asia Minor disaster, and the latter is reported to have joined the revolutionaries last September, also having been witness at the trial of the six Cabinet Ministers executed on Tuesday.

GERMAN REPARATIONS.

PARIS, Nov. 30. Premier Poincare has accepted the invitation of Bonar Law to a conference of the Premiers of Great Britain, France, Italy and Belgium in London on December 10th, to discuss German reparations.

IRISH BILL IN LORDS.

LONDON, Nov. 30. The same comparative apathy attended the discussion of the Irish constitution in the Lords as in the Commons, and the Bill passed the second reading without division.

NEWFOUNDLAND WAS REPRESENTED.

CALGARY, Nov. 30. For the first time in the history of the Maritime Provinces Association annual re-union here, Newfoundland was represented, last night, when more than one thousand natives of Prince Edward Island, gathered at the Wick and Nova Scotia gathered at the Palliser Hotel to honor the provinces by the sea. A. M. Peters, supervisor of Alberta branches of the Bank of Montreal, and a native of Newfoundland spoke on behalf of the ancient Colony. Many of these present displayed flags indicating that they came from Newfoundland. Mr. Peters said, "I wish to congratulate the members of the Committee of this organization for undertaking what their fathers failed to do in 1867, when they endeavored to bring about Confederation. I am sure the spirit of national good will and amity will always prevail." (Mr. Peters is a brother of Messrs. Joseph, William, and George Peters of this city.—Ed.)



OTTAWA, Nov. 30. The highest total wheat in Canada since 1915 is the estimate of the 1922 crop, issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, which estimates the wheat harvest at 391,000,000 bushels, an average yield of 17 1/2 bushels to the acre of land yielding.

GREECE IS BANKRUPT.
LAUSANNE, Nov. 30. Former Grecian Premier Venezelos told the sub-Commission on Ottoman debts this afternoon, without mincing his words, that Greece was ruined and could not pay any portion of the debt

JONES APOLOGIZES.
LONDON, Nov. 30. Jack Jones, Labor member in the Commons for West Ham, reappeared in the House to-day, after having been ejected yesterday following his reference to Ministers as "dirty dogs." He tendered an apology and resumed his seat.

WILSON GETS A SEAT.
LONDON, Nov. 30. A seat has been found for Colonel Leslie Wilson, chief Conservative whip defeated in St. George Division of Westminster in the General Elections. Major H. H. Kayser, elected in South Portsmouth, resigned in order to make way for Colonel Wilson.

NAVAL DISARMAMENT.
LONDON, Nov. 30. Commander Monsell, Financial Secretary to the Admiralty, announced in the Commons yesterday that the capital ship strength of the navies of Great Britain, the United States and Japan, respectively is twenty-three, twenty-six and fifteen. Of these the Washington Agreement demands that Great Britain scrap one, the United States eight, and Japan five.
