New Garden Tool

PERFORMS THREE OPERATIONS.
A weeder, a mulcher, and cultivator are combined in a new hand-pushed garden implement resembling a lawnmower in appearance and operation. Its triple function and the rapidity with which it works are said to lessen labor greatly.

Eight blades, set in revolving reel, revolve against a stationary knife. This knife, slightly behind the blades, travels just below the surface of the soil, cutting the weeds and their roots. The revolving blades destroy

any weeds that escape, pulverize the clods, and aerate the soil.
Between the blades and the knife is a five-eighth-inch space. The gran-

ulated top crust pours evenly over the knife through this, leaving a level ridges on top.
The cultivator attachment need not

be used when only shallow cultivation is desired. When not in use, it rides on top.

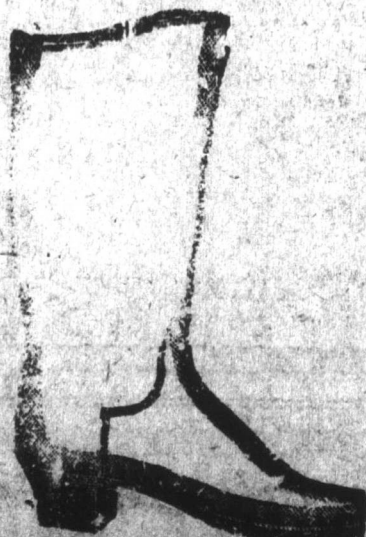
