HOW CONGRESS WAS BUNCOED.
Director-General Davis Beats of the
Chicago Fair Beal.
CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—Director-General
Davis, of the World's Columbian Com-
mission, is quoted as saying that Congress
has generally understood the bill called for
The World's Columbian Commission re-
ceived \$120,000; the Board of Lady Man-
agers, \$110,000; the Government Exhibit
Board, \$400,000; medals and diplomas,
\$100,000; for less on coinage of souvenirs,
\$50,000; the World's Columbian Exposi-
tion, \$2,500,000. Total, \$3,283,000.
"I have counted nothing," he said, "for
the premium on the half dollars is worth at
least 75 cents. A moderate estimate will
give us \$300,000 profit there, so that we
may thank Congress for making us a
present of nearly \$4,000,000 when we had
asked only a loan of \$5,000,000. I feel
sure that the more the friends of the fair
consider the question the more they will
favor the value of the legislation in its
favor."

New York bankers are reported as saying
the demand for money from the west will

money rates will continue easy.

The United States official cotton crop re-
port for the month shows the lowest August
average since 1886, the percentage having
fallen from 86.9 in July to 82.3.

In the middle of the Ohio River, six
miles below Louisville, a terrible battle
was fought Sunday by tugs in two shifts.
Ed. Biel was knocked overboard and
drowned.

The London Chronicle's Rome corre-
spondent says: The Pope's desire to make
an American cardinal at the next con-
sistory has been frustrated by the
divergent views of Archbishops Corri-
gan and Ireland.

Articles of incorporation have been filed
at Sacramento for a flour milling com-
pany with a capital of \$10,000,000. The com-
bine is called the Sperry Flour Company, and
practically includes all the flour milling in-
terests of California.

A dispatch from Monte Vista, Col., says
that P. J. Sheridan, who was charged
with the Phoenix Park murders, was
crushed between a vehicle and a gate at his
ranch, eight miles south of that place, and
probably fatally hurt.

Mary Bates, the 15-year-old girl who
eloped July 6 with Samuel C. Lawrence, a
wealthy druggist of Medford, N. J., re-
turned to her home in that village yester-
day. The girls said that Lawrence had
abandoned her at Niagara Falls. He is
said to be on his way to South America.

At Eagle Lake, a village six miles from
Manitowish, Minn., Mrs. Martha Koster
murdered her two little children. Sunday
morning the woman fed milk poisoned
with rough on rats to her 4-
week-old babe, and on Tuesday
dressed the other down a 70-foot well,
drowning him. The babe was arrested and
prevented from committing suicide in the
jail by close watching.

**Two Big Real Estate Deals—Successful
Trip of Electric Cars.**

TORONTO, Aug. 10.—Two big real estate
deals are reported to-day which seem to
indicate that the bottom has not quite
fallen out of Toronto yet. Traders' Bank
building, corner Yonge and Colborne
streets, sold by S. E. McKinnon to John
Dyran, of W. A. Murray & Co., for \$125,-
000 cash; and S. H. Janes has sold 45 feet
north side King, between Yonge and
Victoria, to George A. Cox, president of the
Bank of Commerce, for \$90,000 or \$2,000 a
foot.
