A largely-signed petition was received from residents in wards 4 and 5 relative to the matter. The creek, it was stated, had become so badly polluted that some action should be taken at once to abate the nuisance, which was a menace to the health of the community. The odor from the discharge into the creek of drains connected with the Military School and private residences was extremely objectionable, and prompt measures should be taken to end a state of things that might produce an epidemic of disease.
