The City Hall last evening to con-

Farke, Andrew Thomson, V. Conroy,

After consultation, an agreement for
one year was concluded, subject to the
approval of the Children's Aid
Society and Protestant Orphans' Home
Board, under which the Protestant
Orphans' Home management is to ac-
cept all Children's Aid Society children
and give them all the advantages of
the home, at a stated sum per child per
week.

Close of the Proceedings at Col-
lingwood.

Clarke Wallace Re-Elected Grand Master
—The Government-Official Op-
position Fizzled Out—Manitoba
Schools Resolution.

Collingwood, Ont., May 28.—Nothing
of great importance transpired at the
session of the Grand Lodge held yester-
day morning.

At 12:30 o'clock Grand Lodge ad-
journd to enjoy a trip on the bay on
the steamer Majestic, on the invitation
of the local committee.

On resuming last evening, the re-
port of the special committee on the
Manitoba school question was taken
up, and a prolonged discussion en-
sued. The report was as follows:
"We most heartily approve of the
course pursued by our M. W. grand
master, Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, in
resigning from his position under the
Government when it became evident
that the Government had adopted as
part of their policy the exclusion of
Manitoba by interfering with the Pro-
vincial autonomy of the Province in
educational matters. We have received
with satisfaction the almost unani-
mous expressions of concurrence on the
part of the order, through primary,
district and county lodges, with our
honored grand master in the course
he has pursued, and as a Grand Lodge
convened, we reaffirm our unalterable
determination to stand by the prin-
ciple of a non-sectarian school system,
and our unwavering fidelity to Bro.
Wallace and those who stood with
him in the support of the principles.

While commending those who fought
for these principles, as emphatically
expressed by resolutions at former
sessions of this Grand Lodge, our posi-
tion would be inconsistent were we
not to most strongly disapprove, and
express our disappointment and dis-
satisfaction with the conduct of those
members of Parliament who deserted
our grand master at what we con-
sider one of the most critical periods
in the movement, and who have ig-
nored the expressed wishes of this
Grand Lodge, while continuing in
membership in the order, and who
still manifest their determination to
support remedial legislation. We have
noticed with intense interest the ef-
forts of the Roman Catholic priesthood
to push remedial legislation through
Parliament, and it has been a matter
of great satisfaction that their efforts
have been frustrated, and that our M.
W. grand master, with the band of
true patriots who stood with him, were
able to so obstruct the measure as to
defeat its enactment, and thus afford
the electorate an opportunity of ex-
pressing an opinion. We again com-
mend the conduct of those members
of Parliament who are opposing Fed-
eral interference. We believe it to be
the duty of every loyal Canadian to
use every constitutional means to have
those opposed to remedial legislation
elected to Parliament, and to strenu-
ously oppose the election of all candi-
dates who will not openly declare their
determination to oppose any legisla-
tion that will impose a separate school
system upon Manitoba." The report
was signed by Wm. Lockhart, D. P.
Watson, A. Bradley, Wm. Galbraith,
John C. Galt, Herman P. Pitts.

After a long, warm and at times ex-
citing debate, the report was adopted,
the result being received with great
cheering.

The election of officers was proceed-
ing, and resulted as follows: Mr. N.
Clarke Wallace, G. M., and Mr. J.
Armstrong, D. G. M., both by acclama-
tion.

Rev. W. F. Wilson was elected
chaplain, defeating the Rev. J. C.
Madill, past president of the P. A. M.
Mr. Robert Birmingham was re-elected
secretary.
