The Escape of Colin More From the Hospital.

Statements Read From Members of the Staff Who Had Connection With the Case-Bylaws Read and Changes Made.

The hospital trust met in special session yesterday afternoon, and decided to investigate the circumstances surrounding the escape of the late Colin More from the Victoria Hospital on Thursday night last. The inquiry will be made on Friday afternoon, at the regular meeting of the trust. In compliance with a request from one of the trustees, Dr. Balfour obtained signed statements from five members of the hospital staff, who had connection with the case.

Miss McNab, the nurse in charge of More, reported that she came on duty at 7 o'clock on the evening in question Dr. Drake had visited the patient at 9:30, and remarked on leaving that the latter would probably die during the night. Between 11 and 12 o'clock More had become very delirious, and had gotten out of bed, but had returned immediately. His friends were then sent for. Dr. Balfour had paid his customary nightly visit at about 12 o'clock, and some time after Miss McNab had gone to supper, leaving Mr. G. O. Roadhouse in charge. She had not been gone very long when Mr. Roadhouse was heard calling, and in company with Miss McCutcheon she had run to the patient's ward. Roadhouse told them that he had had a struggle with More. and had shut him in the Oddfellows' room. On entering the lodge ward, the patient was nowhere to be found. The window was half-open and a chair stood beneath it. Drs. Drake and Ballfour had been immediately summoned. the police notified and a search instituted.

The statement of G. O. Roadhouse. male attendant, who was with the patient on the night that he escaped, was read, and, briefly summarized, was as follows: He had gone in to treat More at 12:30, and the latter said he would get out of bed, and go to a hotel or a drug store, to get something to stop him vomiting. He told the patient that he had better keep quiet, as everything possible was being done. More again vomilted, and started to get out of bed. He tried to reason with him, but the patient sprang up and made for the door. He caught him by the arm, but More was too much for him, and he (Roadhouse) opened the door to get out and summon aid, when More caught hallway. He (Roadhouse) then caught More by the shoulders, and forced him into a room near by and closed the door. The nurses, who were at their midnight supper, were hurriedly summoned, but upon entering the room shortly after it was found that the patient had escaped through a window More was searched for, but could not

The depositions of Miss Murray, a nurse, Miss McCutcheon, the night superintendent, and C. D. Fuller, male artitenidiant, were also read. They substantiated the statements made by Miss McNab and Mr. Roadhouse.

OF THE SEVENTH

Handed in Their Names to Col. Buchan Last Night.

Instructions to Call for Volunteers Had Not Arrived, but All Will Pe Settled by Tomorrow Night.

Expectancy was the characteristic of those assembled at the drill shed last night. The hold that military enthusiasm has taken upon Londoners was evidenced in the numbers who attended the drill. Not only the Seventh men themselves, who turned out in good numbers, but citizens of all classes were there expecting that more definite announcements would be made in regard to the Canadian contingent. They were disappointed, however. Col. Buchan, who was there, said that as yet the officers at the barracks had received no instructions to call for volunteers. They had word, however, that they might receive the names of those willing to go. Of these there were 30 who sent in their names, and it is expected that more will apply to-day. Quite a number of civilians expressed their desire to go, if possible, and some joined the Seventh last night in order to secure any advantage that might ensue from being a member of a military organization. Further particulars will be made public as soon as the official order is received from Ottawa. This will not be long distant, and a prominent official at the barracks has given his assurance that everything will be finally settled and in good working order by tomorrow night.
