They were returning from the high court meeting of the Canadian Order of Foresters at Sherbrooke, Que., and occupied seats in the car ahead of the two that were derailed. They escaped without injury, and rendered assistance in rescuing the passengers from the ill-fated cars.

—At the adjourned annual meeting of the Seventh Battalion officers, held last night, a committee was appointed to inquire as to the proposed review at Toronto, and report. PERSONALITIES

Engage the Attention of City Council Members.

A Little Business Done—Motions Incidental to Individual Grievances or Schemes—Several Recommendations Referred Back.

The aldermen met last evening and spent the usual time—about four hours—indulging in petty personalities, with occasional outburst of unrestrained anger and a fair share of ludicrous posing. The business transacted was infinitesimal, though in a measure incidental. Ald. Plant and Ald. Garratt were absent, the former being still confined in his house, and the latter having just arrived home from England. The communications were unimportant, and were sent to committees. Several clauses of the committee reports were referred back. The increases in firemen's salaries suggested by No. 3 committee were referred to No. 1 committee. No. 3 committee's recommendation that tenders for street watering for the current year be called for, was sent back to get estimates of cost by day labor, and consider the engineer's suggestion as to the establishment of an area within which all streets should be watered. The boundary Mr. Graydon suggested was: Commencing at Piccadilly and St. George's streets, to Adelaide, to York, to Wellington, to Simcoe, to Talbot, to Horton, to Ridout, to Albert, to Talbot, to Ann, to St. George, to the place of starting. In addition, other streets usually included in special contracts would be watered. A recommendation to flush the asphalt pavements every day in dusty weather was also sent back to No. 3 committee. No. 2 committee's recommendation that London Street Railway Company be granted permission to transfer their tracks on Wellington street, between Huron street and St. James street, to Richmond street, was referred back for further consideration.

The committee was empowered to spend \$150 in the construction of 50 feet of breakwater at Front street, the filling in at the back of the breakwater to be done by the ratepayers. A penalty clause to insure the completion of the work by the ratepayers was struck out.

The tenders for laying cement walks during the coming year were referred back. Ald. Cooper claimed the lowest tender in one instance did not get the contract.

Ald. Douglass and Ald. Cooper backed up Ald. Jolly in an effort to have the city pay \$50,000. Messrs. Hellmuth & Ivie's bill of costs in the Hamilton investigation. Ald. Cooper shook his fist at Ald. Malloch, accusing him of having ruined Hamilton, and Ald. Malloch, in reply, called Ald. Cooper a liar. The motion to pay the bill was knocked out on the mayor's vote.

Despite protests and foreboding that the London Art School would be abolished if not supported, a motion to grant the institution \$100 was defeated 7 to 5.

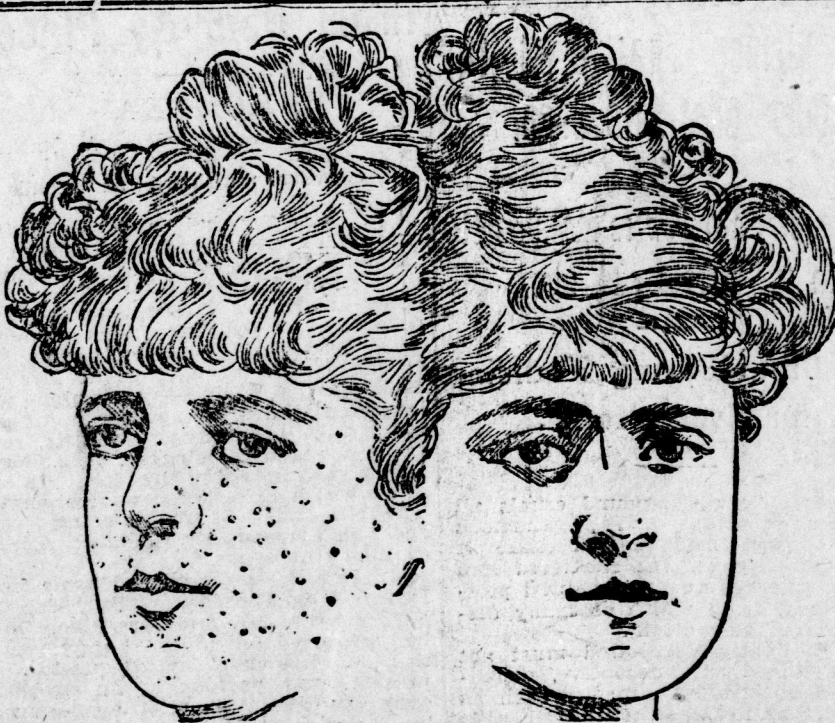
