Now Confronts the British War Office.

The Call for Volunteers to Relieve Regiments Is Ignored.

The Kaiser Will Mot Attend the Coronation of King Edward-Chamberlain Strikes Back at His Critics.

CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS IGNORED London, Jan. 13 .- The British war office is confronted with a serious condition of affairs. Its call for volunteers to relieve the regiments at the front has so far met with absolutely no response, and has served to intensify the widespread indignation existing among all the volunteer regiments. In the first place, volunteers answering the call would only receive a shilling per day, while the yeomany, in which many volunteers have already enlisted, receive 5 shillings per day. The only solution for the deadlock appears to be for the war office to introduce conscription or withdraw the new regulations. These have stirred up strife to an extent which has not existed for many a year between the government officials and the voluntary arm of the service.

IMPRACTICABLE RULES. According to the new rules every regiment must go into camp for one week each year, and the government grant will be reduced in proportion to the number of absentees from the camp. The volunteers' commanders say it is impossible to get more than 40 per cent of the men together the same week, so different are the occupations of the volunteers. In addition the war office refuses to recognize drills which are not attended by a percentage of men which it has hitherto been found quite impossible to attain, and imposes battalion parades of such strength that there is no drill hall or drill grounds in London large enough to enable the battalions to maneuver.

KAISER WILL NOT ATTEND. A Berlin cable says: Following close after the snub administered to Great Britain on the subect of the Prince of Wales earlier in the week, when the semi-official North German Gazette denied that Emperor William had urged the Prince of Wales to visit Berlin on the occasion of his najesty's birthday celebration, pointing out that the prince had been invited at the request of King Edward, the North German Gazette today pointedly denies that Emperor William will attend either the memorial service in honor of the late Queen or the coronation of King Edward. The paper says the state-ments in the English newspapers on the subject are untrue.

WALES' VISIT TO BERLIN. The same paper says the Prince of Wales' visit will be only for a day. It is intended simply as a token of King

Edward's personal regard for Emperor William. The Prince of Wales, there-fore, has declined all invitations to entertainments proposed in his honor, including a reception by a German tration. regiment of which King Edward is colonel, so that the Germans may be under no misapprehensions regarding the private and personal character of

Had the Prince of Wales been here this morning he would not have been able to read any German periodical that did not contain lampoons on his father, caricatures of Lord Kitchener. or the brutal descriptions of British inhumanity in South Africa. These things do not affect the inflexibly correct attitude of the government, but they intensify the already heated feeling against Britain.

Joseph Chamberlain, the colonial secretary, in speaking at Birmingham Saturday night, took occasion to notice the criticisms showered upon him in the German Reichstag last week, especially Count Von Buelow's castigation. In referring to the animosity of foreign nations, he said he was well aware that in some quarters it was attributed to the "indiscreet oratory

of the colonial secretary."
"What I have said," continued the secretary, "I have said. I withdraw nothing; I qualify nothing; I defend nothing, As I read history, no British minister has ever served his country faithfully and at the same time been popular abroad. I, therefore, make allowance for foreign criticism. I will not follow the example that has been set me. I do not want to give lessons to a foreign minister, and I will not accept any at his hands. I am responsible only to my sovereign and

GET ANOTHER SCAPEGOAT. "I do not deprecate the importance the good will of foreign nations, but there is something more impor tant. It is the affection and confidence of our kinsfolk across the sea. Even our great losses in the war that has been forced upon us have brought in their train one blessing of infinite and lasting importance. That war has enabled the British Empire to find itself, and has shown to all whom it may concern that if ever again we have, as in the past, to fight for our very existence against the world in arms, we will be supported by the sons of Britain in every quarter of the
