CUNARD LINERS

British Company Annuls Agree- 100,000 Men and Women Are ment With Morgan's Combine, Alleging Unfair Treatment.

New York, June 23.-Various reports having been circulated as to the statement as to the Cunard Line's position was obtained yesterday:

"February last the Cunard Steamship Co. gave the necessary three months' notice to the North Atlantic conference at Liverpool, as provided in the agreement, of its withdrawal of its passenger service from the continental and British agreement. Three months having expired and nothing having been done to meet the demands of the Cunard Line, nothing further remained but to make the withdrawal

"The company feels that there are too many ships in the trade-in other words, the supply exceeds the demand and there can be no relief from the existing situation without the withdrawal of the extra tonnage which had been put into the trade by our competitors; and further, the Cunard Company demands a readjustment to correct the inequalities which now exist in the classification of some of its steamers, so far as passenger rates

in withdrawing from the agreement is simply a desire to place itself in a position where it can protect its share of the trade. Berlin, June 23.—The German author ities have begun an active campaign attitude of the Cunard Steamship Line against medical quacks. The German government has finally

determined to subject all professes curers who are not recognized medical practitioners to the severest surveillance. They will be given a month secure other employment, and if the end of that time they persist practice they will be prosecuted. The Government is in possession statistics which show that more than 100,000 men and women are illegally practicing medicine and the art of healing in Germany, and that this number is rapidly increasing. One medical statistician says he has found 150 cases of cancer in his province. Of these twenty-five are attended by authorized physicians and 108 by quacks. He maintains it is nearly as bad in other diseases which particularly call for trained medical

Most of these quacks allege that they have occult powers, personal magnetism, "magnetic eyes and hands," and that a cure will be the immediate consequence of implicit re liance in this treatment.
