TOWNSHIP COUNCILS.

LONDON.

London Township Council met in the town hall, St. Johns, Monday, Aug. 10, with all the members present. The minutes of previous meeting were read and signed.

Mr. George C. Gunn, solicitor for the Chelsea Land and Building Company, asked the consent of the council to permit, in so far as their jurisdiction extends, the company to build a bridge over the River Thames at Adelaide street. Consent given, and bylaw No. 457, to confirm same, read three times and passed.

The reeve gave a verbal report of his trip to Ottawa in the case of the C. P. R. vs. London Township, before the committee of railways. It was agreed to meet the C. P. R. engineer at the bridge in question, on 3, on Thursday, Aug. 6, at 2 o'clock p.m.

The resignation of Dr. A. T. Steele as medical health officer was accepted. Moved by J. McLeod, seconded by Geo. Kimball, that Dr. C. C. Ross be appointed medical health officer for the balance of the year 1903. Carried.

Moved by H. Needham, seconded by J. McLeod, that the following accounts be paid: George Wilson, repairing bridge, \$2; T. J. Chaffin, plank for bridge, \$12.75; R. Scott, half cost excavating and spreading 12 cords gravel, \$2; Ed. Douglas, putting new needle-beam in bridge, \$2; J. R. Hodgins, expenses to Ottawa re case C. P. R. vs. London Township, \$3; C. Roberts, half cost 20 cords gravel, \$6; J. Ryan, half cost drawing and putting in tile, filling up ditch, relaying tile and grading and putting in concrete culvert, \$2.25; W. Scott, putting plank on bridge, \$2.50; J. Ryland, 28 feet rock elm timber and drawing same for bridge, \$2.62; Wm. Bowman, half cost 25 cords gravel, \$5.35; G. L. Shipley, gravel, etc., \$11.72; Kimball Bros., rock elm plank, \$7.00; E. C. Logan, repairing two bridges on Adelaide street, \$1; J. McElfitt, half cost excavating and spreading 20 cords gravel, \$2. Carried.

STORM AT MARTINIQUE

Unroofed Many Buildings and Wrecks Sailing Craft.

Fort de France, Martinique, Aug. 11.—Martinique was swept by a hurricane of great violence Saturday night. Its duration was ten hours. Hundreds of houses were unroofed here and several sailing vessels were badly damaged. No fatalities, however, have been reported. The streets are covered with debris and the roads are impassable with fallen trees. Several towns on the island suffered considerably.

Kingston, Jamaica, Aug. 10.—The tail-end of a hurricane moving over the island struck the eastern end of the island of Jamaica this afternoon and did great damage to the banana properties of the Fruit Company and the Jamaica Company (Limited). The full extent of the injury is still unknown. The hurricane appeared to be moving northward in the direction of Cuba.

LOOSE LION AT CONEY

His Growl Starts a Panic on the Beach.

New York, Aug. 9.—Prince, one of the lions in a menagerie at Coney Island, escaped from his cage last night and suddenly appeared on the board walk, which was crowded with pleasure seekers. The beast is only 18 months old, born in captivity, and is said to be as tame as a cat. But Prince has just the same kind of growl as the most ferocious lion of the desert. When he found himself unexpectedly surrounded by a lot of creatures who were scrambling to get out of reach, until the piece was turned into a perfect bedlam. The keepers say they knew that it would be enough to take him by the neck and drag him away, but to reassure the scared mob of sightseers they marched out in full force, armed with pitchforks and long iron rods, and arranged themselves in a close circle about Prince.

The lion was restored to his cage in the most impressive manner possible, a barricade being rigged up for the purpose. It took an hour to do it that way.

MAPLE GROVE.

Maple Grove, Aug. 11.—Grove is well named and charmingly situated on the banks of Lake Huron, one mile north of Grand Bend. It comprises twenty acres of wooded land fronting on the lake, where there is a very fine beach for bathing.

BURGLAR BAND WAS CORRALED

Caught in the Act of Ransacking a Toronto Private Residence.

Toronto, Aug. 11.—A desperate gang of armed housebreakers was rounded up by the police yesterday afternoon, and they are believed to be the burglars that have been operating so extensively in this city and in Hamilton. Accident in a measure accomplished what the efforts of the police had been unable to do.

While Detective Forrest was waiting on a street corner near Rosedale for a car, he noticed Charles Quackenbush, who on July 11 made a daring escape from the Central Prison, walking up the street with Thomas Gallagher, alias Murphy, and Steven Doyle, both crooks, with several convictions to their credit. He followed them through Rosedale, where they ineffectually sized up several houses.

Finally they picked up No. 469 Sherbourne street, occupied by Mrs. Brodie, but unoccupied at the time. A fourth companion, whom Forrest did not know, sat on the front steps, ostensibly reading a novel, while the other three entered the house from the rear. Detective Forrest telephoned from a nearby grocery store for help, and when the police came up the side watchman ran and escaped.

The house was surrounded, and when Forrest at the head of the two others went in and reached the top of the stairs, he was confronted by a pointed revolver in the hands of Gallagher. The revolver was knocked from his hands and the gang quickly seized. They had in the meantime rifled the house, ripped up valises, and got a lot of stuff together. In their clothing were found diamonds and jewelry, the proceeds of other robberies, while each man was armed with a revolver.

This is the gang that is supposed to have recently robbed a general store and postoffice at Kitchener. The police believe they know where the rendezvous of the gang is and are searching for other plunder.

BATTLE WITH BANDITS

A Plucky Sheriff Kills Two of Them and is Wounded.

Washington, Aug. 11.—The commissioner of Indian Affairs yesterday received the following telegram from Agent Mitchell, in charge of the Osage Indian agency, at Pawhuska, Oklahoma Territory: "Officers Dermott, Haines and Majors in pitched battle with outlaws Sunday evening killed one and mortally wounded another. The third is still at large. Officer Haines was dangerously wounded."

WRECK NEAR BARRIE

Three Trainmen Injured, One of Whom Has Since Died.

Barrie, Ont., Aug. 11.—As a result of an accident to a freight train near Penetang Saturday evening extra fireman Andrew Curtis sustained fatal injuries. Engineer Curtis had four ribs broken and his back hurt, and brakeman Henry Ardell lost an arm. The rest of the crew escaped with slight injuries. The engine jumped the track rounding a sharp curve at the end of a large culvert and fell across the track, wrecking several cars. Dougall was caught between the engine and tender and was crushed. He was taken to Penetanguishene Hospital, where he died Saturday night. He was 26 years of age, son of James Dougall, sen., of Barrie, and was making a trial trip before being given a position permanently.

3,000 MINERS OUT

Many of the Cripple Creek Mines Are Closed Down.

Cripple Creek, Col., Aug. 11.—More than 3,000 miners went on strike here yesterday and all the mines except the Portland, C. K. and N. El Paso, Strong and Golden King are closed down. It is said that within a few days all union miners in this district will be called out in order to stop shipments not only to the United States refining and reduction companies' mills, but also to the smelters operated by the American Smelting and Refining Company, because of its refusal to grant an eight-hour day at its Denver smelters.

A C. P. R. STATEMENT

Prosperous Condition of the Big Road—New Members of Board.

Montreal, Aug. 10.—At the meeting of the directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company today, a dividend of 2 per cent on the preference stock for the half-year ended June 30 last was declared. A dividend of 3 per cent for the same period was also declared on the common stock.

The results for the fiscal year to June 30 last were: Gross earnings, \$2,927,272; expenses, \$2,150,227; net earnings, \$777,045; income from other sources, \$2,286,812—total net income, \$3,063,857—less fixed charges, \$7,052,197; less amount applied against ocean steamships, \$150,000. Net revenue available for dividends, \$2,241,660.

After payment of all dividends declared the surplus for the year carried forward is \$3,373,900.

A special report which caused great satisfaction among the directors was one that had been prepared on the condition of the crops in the west and the manner in which the Canadian Pacific would be able to handle their share of it. It showed that from a point of view of profit that the farmers make from it, this year's crop will be a record one, notwithstanding the fact that the amount to be shipped is somewhat less than last year. The company, with the number of cars and engines it now has on hand, would be able to rush the grain to the lake or ports right along, and prevent the possibility of any blockade on any of the branch lines.

Sir William Van Horne presided, and the two Toronto directors, E. B. Osler and W. D. Matthews, were among those present.

The following were added to the board: Clarence W. Mackay, New York; Hon. Robert Mackay, Hon. Geo. F. Edmund, E. M. Reid and D. McNicholl, Montreal.

New Assessment Law.

Toronto, Aug. 10.—This city loses one million dollars in assessment by the new law increasing the exemption from income tax from \$500 to \$1,000 a year. In one ward alone, No. 3, the loss is \$75,000, and the poorer wards will bring the amount to at least 2 million.
