In British Columbia 35 miles will be constructed on Arrowhead and Koot-enay Lake to Girard, on Trout Lake. In addition to the above a million dollars will be expended for improvements on the main line between Smith's Falls and Toronto, by which the grades will be reduced, many curves eliminated and the haulage capacity of locomotives increased by 70 per cent.

THE DEATH RECORD

Demise of Rear-Admiral W. T. Sampson From Crebral Hemorrhage.

Washington, D. C., May 7 .- Rear Admiral W. T. Sampson (retired) died at his home in this city at 5 o'clock this afternoon. The immediate cause of death was a severe cerebral hemorrhage. He had been in a semiconscious state for several days, and this afternoon the hemorrhage occurred. At the bedside, when the admiral breathed his last were Mrs. Sampson, MMrs. (Lieut.) Cluverius, the admiral's married daughter; Admiral Sampson's two young sons, Ralph and Harold Sampson; Dr. Dixon, the attending physician, and nurses and attendants. Mrs. Sampson had broken down under the severe strain, and was quite ill during all the day. But for the critical

condition of the admiral she would have been confined to her bed. During the Spanish-American war Sampson's command numbered 125 vessels, his fleet being the strongest ever organized for hostile purposes, capturing many Spanish merchant vessels and blockade runners, and finally defeating the Spanish fleet under

Admiral Cervera. In December, 1898, he resumed command of the North Atlantic squadron. On Oct. 14, 1899, he was made commandant of the Boston navy which position he held until illness compelled him to retire. The closing years of Admiral Sampson's life were embittered by the Sampson-Schley controversy.

NO STRIKE!

Coal Operators and Operatives Said to Have Come to Terms

New York, May 6.-The presidents of the leading anthracite coal roads, as well as some of the more important inindependent producers, held a conference of several hours' duration in this city today. According to report the conference was attended by the executive heads of the Lackawanna, Delaware and Hudson, Reading and Onta-rio and Western roads. The Erie is said to have been represented by Chairman Thomas. No information concerning the meeting was obtainable from official sources. A representative of one of the roads mentioned is authority for the statement that the strike situation was thoroughly discussed and that action favorable to the miners was taken. The strength of the coal stocks in the afternoon, together with the emphatic denial of a member of the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co., that there will be no strike, were accepted as proof that pacific action will be taken at the miners' convention, to be held in Scranton tomorrow.

An organization being effected at Carbondale, Pa., to be known as the Amalgamated Common Laborers of America, is, it is said, a secession from the American Federation of Labor. The American Federation of Labor.



Trade With Australia and South Africa.

Direct Line of Steamers-Sir Wilfria Laurier's Statement in the House.

Ottawa, May 6.-A very large amount of business was transacted today, and when, after passing a large number of items during the day, the house went into concurrence on a number of items which had been passed in committee, a distinct step forward towards prorogation was taken.

The supplementary estimates for 1902-1903 will be brought down tomorrow, and these constitute practically all the government business yet remaining to be disposed of. THE JUNE CAMPS.

Upon the item for annual drill and musketry of the militia, Hon. Dr. Borden, replying to Mr. George Taylor, said that he was not quite sure all the June camps would be held this year, but the cavalry and field artillery will be drilled full strength. The drills in the cities will, of course, go on as before. A large portion of the further sum of \$31,000 required for the Dominion arsenal was, Dr. Borden said, for the purpose of repairing, etc., the guns and material injured in the South African campaign. THE CANAL EXPENDITURES.

Hon. Mr. Blair asked to have his estimate of \$50,000 for deepening and widening the Galops Rapids channel reduced to \$25,000, which, he said, would be sufficient to meet the drawback on Gilbert & Co.'s contract.

THE INTERCOLONIAL. In reply to a question by Dr. Sproule the minister of railways said that the statement he made the other day was that down to the end of last month there was a deficit of \$135,000 in the Intercolonial Railway, as compared with a deficit of \$500,000 during the corres-ponding period of the preceding year. In the case of Carr vs. O'Rourke, before the divisional court at Toronto, on Saturday, judgment (R.) was given on appeal by plaintiff from judgment of the surrogate court of the county of Kent, dismissing this action by the brother of Daniel Carr, deceased, to revoke letters of administration of his estate granted to defendant, who is married to a niece of the deceased. The surrogate judge held that plaintiff, having for many years been a resident of, and domiciled in a foreign country, was not intitled to administer, providing that any other fit and proper person of equal degree of relationship to deceased or the appointee of such person applied, and that at all events, plaintiff is practically blind, and from age and physical infirmities not a fit and proper person; that there was no evidence of collusion between the committee and the plaintiff, and that it was not the practice to cite people living outside the province, where, as in this case, suitable relatives resided in it. Appeal dismissed with costs. M. Wilson, K.C., and J. B. O'Flynn (Chatham), for plaintiff; A. B. Aylesworth, K.C., for defendant.

BRYANSTON .- 1. How long is it since the present system of waterworks in London, with the reservoir at Springbank, were placed? Ans.—Since 1878. 2. In what year did the disaster occur on the Thames, in which so many were drowned, by the collapse of the small steamer? How many were drowned? Was it on the trip out to Springbank, or the return? How far from the city did it occur? The name of the boat? Were all the bodies recovered identified? Did the disaster occur on May 24, and what hour of the day? Ans.-The disaster occurred on 24th May, 1881, on the return trip of the steamer Victoria, about a mile from the city limits,, about five hundred yards west of the cove railway bridge, about o'clock in the afternoon. Some of the bodies were not recovered immediately, and when recovered were not positively identified. The number

drowned was 183, or thereabouts. SARNIA .- Can the superintendant of the waterworks who collects the rates, legally hold the office of town treasur-Ans.-There is no statutory prohibition, nor any judicial decision on the question, but upon the principles of the common law he should hold only one office when one is a check upon the other, as in this case.

BARN.-Can a man build a barn and get it patented and prevent any person else from building one like it without buying a right? Ans.—If he has invented a wholly new kind of barn he can get it patented and prevent anyone from using his invention, without purchasing the right to do so. He may not, however, be able to patent the inventions as to the whole barn, but only as to his improvements, and his rights would be limited accordingly.
