Even is he has a gangrene of a small area of the cecum from a periaphendical abscess his chances of recovery should be good unless the infection be very virulent. One would infer from the mild symptoms of the day previous to the operation that it was not violent. If the perityphlitis abscess be from a per-forating ulcer of cecum, the prognosis is more grave, for these perfor-

The assumption that the abscess is of appendical origin is the most logical from his symptoms of pain and syncope on the fifth or sixth day preceding the operation.
