# LIGHTNING DURING STORM WHICH WORKED GREAT HAVOC

Three Men Suffered When Power House of Traction Company Was Hit---A Little Girl on Cheapside Street Had Shoe Torn From Foot --- Crops of the District Suffered Severely.

London was struck by one of the worst thunderstorms of the year yesterday afternoon shortly after 3 o'clock, and much damage was done. There were no lives lost, but there were several miraculous escapes.

Four persons were injured:

Robert Quayle, Chelsea Green. Robert Roberts, Chelsea Green, stunned.

George Kerr, 12 Thornton avenue.

Miss Lucille Pepper, 462 Cheapside street. None are seriously injured.

The storm lasted for an hour, accompanied by incessant lightning. The wind created considerable havoc with farmers' crops, corn especially suftering from the fury of the storm.

Several barns are reported burned within a radius of a few miles. The storm area was quite extensive. It came from the southwest, and followed along the lake shore, extending a few miles north of this city. TERRIFIC WIND.

A terrific wind accompanied the rain, and in their train came very dan-

It reached London shortly after 3 o'clock, and for a few minutes para-

The wind and driving rain made it almost impossible to get about and completely tied up the street railway services.

The company had several cars put out of commission by the rain and lightning. The Southwestern Traction Company's lines were tied up for four hours,

from 3 o'clock in the afternoon until 7 o'clock in the evening. Several places were struck by lightning, and the wind lifted several

HIT POWERHOUSE.

The Southwestern Traction Company plant suffered considerably from

The first gust of the wind came tearing down upon the company's powerhouse on Chelsea Green. It lifted the southwest corner of it and ripped it completely off.

at work when the roof was torn off.

A perfect cloud of flying bricks and debris settled upon them, and they made a race for their lives.

BURIED BENEATH BRICKS.

Quayle was buried by the bricks and debris, and could not get up. Kerr rushed out. He was struck by a flying brick on the head. . The blow staggered him, but he continued, and escaped. The other men in the building went to Quayle's assistance, and relieved him.

Dr. Teasdall was summoned and found that Quayle was suffering from bruises on the back and elbow. It was thought that the spine was seriously affected, but this morning Dr. Teasdall says the injuries, while painful, will not prove serious, and that after a few weeks he will be out.

Kerr was struck on the head by a flying brick, and a bad gash resulted. The blow was a glancing one, and the skull was not fractured. He was also badly bruised by bricks. He will be confined to his room for a week.

The escape of the two men from death is remarkable, as it is puzzling to understand how they got out from the shower of brick that fell around them. A THRILLING EXPERIENCE.

Robert Roberts, Chelsea Green, the electrical engineer of the Traction

Company, also had a thrilling experience. It was reported that one of the wires was down, and he rushed out to attend to it. As he was running past a tree, the lightning struck it, shiv-

ering it to pieces. Roberts was knocked down by the force of the concussion, and stunned. He got up, and went back to the powerhouse, little the worse for his narrow escape. He was not more than five feet from the tree when it was struck according to the statements of eye-witnesses.

LITTLE GIRL STRUCK. Several houses were struck, the most serious damage being done to the residence of Mr. George Pepper, 462 Cheapside street. The lightning struck the chimney, literally smashed the bricks to pieces, continued down the pipes. shattered the stove to atoms, passed into the cellar, and then into the groun !. Miss Lucille Pepper, the little daughter of Mr. Pepper, was sitting in front of the stove when the lightning struck.

She was thrown violently to the floor by the shock. One of her feet was under the stove, and almost in the direct path of the lightning.

The fluid struck her foot, and tore the shoe off it, and burned her considerably. Her mother rushed into the room and took the child out of the

Dr. McWilliam was summoned, and soon brought her around. The shock to her system was a severe one, and she is very nervous as a result. Her foot is painfully burned, but no serious consequences will result.

The escape of the Pepper girl is nothing short of marvellous. The pieces of the stove were scattered all over the room, and a perfect shower of iron must have encircled her. That she escaped with a few burns is considered remarkable. The lightning did not set fire to the house. WEST LONDON HOME STRUCK.

The home of Mr. S. J. Moore, 231 Wyatt street, West London, was also struck. The lightning entered the chimney, as in the other case, and smashed it to powder.

Two large holes were torn in the roof, and the side of the house shattered somewhat. There was no person injured, as the family were out at the time.

McCLARYS SUFFERED. The McClary Manufacturing Company had considerable damage done to

its property. The large sign on top of the building was twisted and torn until it is practically of no value. The cupola was also struck and smashed considerably.

Several sections of the roof were splintered, and some of the smaller chimneys were damaged somewhat. AT THE ROLLING MILLS.

The lightning played a few tricks with the roof of the London Rolling Mills. The roof is of steel, and the electrical fluid cut a zig-zag course over

It ripped over a large section, and crumpled it up like paper. There was no person injured in the building, although there was considerable uneasiness among the employes while the lightning was tearing through the

LONDON ELECTRIC COMPANY.

The London Electric Company had one armature burned out by the storm. but the damage was not so great as they anticipated. They considered themselves most fortunate that it was no worse.

The lightning also burned out the motor of the Tune pop factory on York The wind cut capers with awnings and trees, and every moveable thing

n the city. DAMAGE IS HEAVY.

The damage is difficult to compute, but it is indeed very considerable. Continued on Page Two.

They gave up their lives | for the cause, and leave honored names as patriots, whose cry was liberty or death. Eight or nine men were hanged before the slaughter of

patriots was stopped, and the same old building which saw their execution still stands at the corner of Dundas and Ridout

The document referred to above was the death warrant of the patriots, who opposed the Family Compact, and reads as fol-"Government House, 29th January, 1839.

"James Hamilton, Esq., Sheriff, London District, London: "Sir,-I have the honor to transmit to you, by command of the Lieutenant-Governor, three warrants for the execution, respectively, at London, of Cornelius Cunningham (on Monday, Feb. 4), Joshua Gillam Doan and Amos Perley (on Wednesday the 6th), pursuant to the sentence of the courtmartial therein stated. His excellency directs that the warrant be publicly read before the prisoners at the time and place of their execution. You will, moreover, have the goodness to acknowledge their receipt by the first post, in order to obviate the necessity of transmitting to you the exemplification usually forwarded in
