Hamilton Sporting Writers Differ
In Opinions of Intermediate Battle

Hamilton scribes differ somewhat in their opinions of Saturday's bout between the Cubs and Dundas.

[Times.] Nearly half of the inhabitants of Dundas were at the cricket grounds here on Saturday to see the interprovincial intermediate match between the Tigers II, and the Dundas team, which up to Saturday afternoon had not been beaten. Nearly two thousand persons witnessed the match, despite the bitter cold. There was considerable betting on the game, which ended in favor of the Tigers by a score of 25 to 12.

The Tigers had the hardest kind of a game, and only their staying power won for them. Dundas was all in at the end of the third quarter, and the Tigers, while badly crippled, were fresh enough to take advantage of this.

At half-time the score was in favor of Dundas 11 to 7, but this was the last chance the red and white supporters had for a cheer.

The intermediate jungle hunters are a real hard bunch, and in a game such as Saturday's was, where fighting counted a whole lot, they outclassed their opponents.

The first round in the annual football and slugging bout between the Tiger Intermediates and Dundas took place on Saturday afternoon at the cricket grounds before a crowd of 1,500 or 2,000, a little over half of whom wore yellow and black, and the rest wore red and white. Three Dundas men were hurt so badly that they either had to be carried or helped off the field, and there was not a man on either team who did not carry off a choice assortment of bruises and cuts. It was a dirty game. Both teams played

ed after the old-fashioned style of "getting to" the men. The Tigers, probably because they were on their own grounds, and had their friends behind them, did the greatest execution. The doctors and ambulance corps were kept on the run. Unless this spirit is checked, the corner will probably have to be called in before the teams decide which is to play off for the intermediate championship.

The impression has gained ground that the Tiger-Dundas game on Saturday was a very rough affair, and that the Dundas injuries were the result of intentional work. This, however, is far from the truth. Of the three accidents in the game, Harrison wrenched his knee when punting; Mallett, who has been sick in bed ever since the London game, was hardly in shape, and his accident was rather to be expected. Laing's injury was the result of a clean tackle, the Dundas player being lifted clean off his feet, falling rather heavily to the ground. The game was hard and sometimes rough, but there was no sign of intentional "dirty work."

"NIBS" HARRISON'S
KNEE IS BROKEN

Dundas Players Generally
Badly Used Up by Tiger
Cubs.

Dundas, Nov. 2. — Willie Mallett and Walter Laing, two of the Dundas Rugby players who were victims of the slaughter at Saturday's game, were able to be out yesterday. Nibs Harrison, whom the Hamilton Tigers selected as a human sacrifice, is in very bad shape, suffering from a kick which broke his knee-cap, and may possibly prevent him playing again. Of the others wounded in the battle, Craig is still very much alive, though he suffered a kick on the fact that necessitated several stitches to close up, while Binkley sustained a cracked rib, but is thankful he is alive. Referee Nelson is coming in for many very uncompromising remarks that would not look well in print as a result of his officiating on Saturday.

JIMMY BRITT
DEFEATS SUMMERS

Decision Almost Caused a Riot
In Old London—Verdict
Given on Points.

London, Nov. 2. — Jimmy Britt, the California fighter, defeated Johnny Summers of England, in the tenth round today at Wembley.

The conditions of the fight called for ten rounds at 133 pounds, the men weighing in at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Summers had the better of the fight during the first two rounds, and Britt, seeming to realize his disadvantage, put more energy into his work and shaped up much better in the succeeding rounds. The Englishman showed great cleverness in the sixth, seventh, and eighth rounds, and looked to be a winner. Britt came back, however, and fought his man to the ropes, gaining a considerable advantage in the ninth and tenth rounds. The American was declared a winner on points, although a considerable section of the spectators who filled the big hall, questioned the referee's decision.

For several minutes there was every indication of a riot, and it was with the utmost difficulty that quiet was restored. Britt and the referee were loudly hooted as they left the hall.

DUNDAS CLUB WILL
ENTER A PROTEST

Dundas, Nov. 2. — The officers of the Dundas Rugby club are feeling pretty sore over Saturday's game and will enter a protest to the union. They claim that one of the two officials was not at all conversant with the game, and they object to two Hamilton men being appointed after the union promising good neutral officials for the game.

Rough Treatment.

The complaint, however, is regarding the rough treatment given the Dundas players by the Tiger team on their home grounds. Of course, there is always an element which is sore over defeat, whether merited or not, but the better element of the club which cheerfully acknowledged the Tigers' superiority last year, is bitter in the complaints about the punishment inflicted on Harrison, and it is more than likely that at tonight's meeting of the Dundas club an appeal will be made to the union to have two Tiger players suspended for brutal work.

When the former Tiger half-back appeared on the field Saturday there were cries of "Kill Harrison, kill Harrison," and they were not from boys, either, but from men who should know better.

No Blame.

Accidents will, of course, happen in such a strenuous game, and the injuries received by Mallett and Laing were a sad blow to the Dundas team, but no particular blame can be placed on the Tiger team. However, in the case of Harrison, Wilson, and Craig, the attacks were deliberate and brutal. Craig was kicked on the head after being downed and at a time when three or four men were on top of him. He had to have his wounds dressed by a doctor on returning to Dundas. It was absolutely uncalled for, and there were other cases of like character, from which Harrison and Wilson suffered, and the management of the local club does not intend to allow such tactics without protest.

MANAGER CHANCE
MAY LEAVE CUBS

Feared Row With President
Murphy Will Result in
Player's Resignation.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—Manager Chance, of the Cubs, accompanied by his wife, left Monday night for San Francisco and other California towns, where he will spend the winter. Whether he returns to manage the world's champions or not depends on President Murphy.

The owner of the team has quarreled with his manager and even threatened to trade him to some other National League team. Unless their differences are straightened out amicably by correspondence during the winter months, Chance will not be with the team he put together and thrice led to National League pennants.

The row between Chance and Murphy was brought on indirectly by Chance's demand for a boost in salary. Chance pointed out to his boss a week ago that he had turned a trick before, winning three league pennants and two world's championships in succession, and insisted that he be reimbursed in commensurate terms. Murphy refused to grant the request for more pay and retaliated by criticizing some of the managerial moves made by Chance during the season just ended. That was the signal for a war. The scrap waxed warmer and Murphy finally proposed to trade Chance. "Well, I would advise you to trade me right now," said Chance. With that piece of advice to the owner, Chance walked out of the office and has not been heard from since.
