J. Tobin, business manager of the Canadian Grocer, will be present at the annual banquet to be held in the City Hotel shortly. Among the speakers will be Mayor Beattie, William Turnbull, J. L. A. Hunt, Col. A. M. Smith and James McDougall.

Vegetable Growers Meet.

The London Branch of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association met in the Duffell Block on Saturday afternoon with a good attendance present. After disposing of business in general, two papers were given on "Growing of Lettuce" and "Growing of Parsnips," by Mr. J. Davis and Mr. Wm. Troit, respectively. The display of lettuce and parsnips that these gentlemen placed on the exhibit table demonstrated the fact that they knew what they were talking about.

Home Mission Work.

A convention of the Woman's Branch of the Home Mission Work Department of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will meet in St. Andrew's Church here on March 22, 23 and 24. Some 300 delegates are expected from all over Canada, and they will be billeted by the different congregations of the Presbyterian churches of the city. Among the speakers will be Rev. Dr. McLean, of Toronto, and Rev. Dr. M. Dickey, late of Dawson City. Rev. Stephen Tildershouse, late superintendent of missions in Northern Ontario, who was among the victims of the wreck at Webbwood Junction, was also to have been one of the speakers on that occasion.

Death of Mrs. Pym.

Mrs. Catherine Pym, widow of the late Wm. Pym, died on Friday at her home, 19 Partridge street. Mrs. Pym was 68 years old, and had been living in Centralia. She came to this country from Devonshire, England. She is survived by three sons and two daughters, John, of this city; Edward, of Toledo; Luther, of Toledo; Mrs. William Buller, of this city, and Miss Mary, at home. The funeral will be held on Tuesday morning at the home of the deceased. The services will be conducted this evening by Rev. E. Mallett.

Union Mothers' Club.

The regular meeting of the Union Mothers' Club was held in the Collegiate Institute. Miss Deyman, the school nurse, of Hamilton, addressed the mothers on medical school inspection. She outlined her work among the schools of Hamilton. After the address many questions were asked, showing the lively interest taken in the matter. Mr. Gammage, chairman of the board of education, was present and spoke. Fresh air, physical exercise, cleanliness, superabundance of clothing, etc., were the subjects which were discussed; also, the wearing of rubbers during school hours. Teachers should insist upon rubbers being removed, as they are detrimental to the general health of the children.

Joint Stars on Saturday.

What promises to be the most important theatrical event of the present season and one of the most important in the history of London, is the engagement of Sir Charles Wyndham and Miss Mary Moore at the Grand next Saturday, Feb. 5, for one performance only, in Robert Henry Davies' comedy, "The Mulliner."

A NEW CIRCUIT.

Toronto, Jan. 31.—Mr. Ambrose J. Small, of Toronto, proprietor of the big Ontario circuit, which bears his name, has been asked by the theatre managers of the Maritime Provinces, to organize a circuit, with Halifax as a centre, on lines similar to that which he has made successful in this Province. Mr. Small has taken the matter under consideration, but no decision has been made.

At present the Maritime Provinces, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, are heavily handicapped theatrically, owing to the absence of organization. No inducement can be offered to owners of important attractions to cover the territory, as each town stands unaffiliated with its neighbor, and unable to offer continuous booking over a definite route. Companies which venture into the provinces are obliged to make separate arrangements with each theatre owner, involving risks which no large company cares to take. This is a contrast to the Ontario system, under which Mr. Small books a tour through ten, fifteen or twenty towns, and makes arrangements in advance, and assuring them of profitable returns.

Should Mr. Small decide to accede to the urgent request of the eastern managers, he would in all probability establish a booking office in Halifax, retaining, of course, his present Toronto headquarters.

GETTING READY FOR BIG CONVENTION

Hardware Men Will Be Here in Large Numbers Next Week.

MADE IN LONDON EXHIBIT

City Hall Will Be Turned Into a Crystal Palace, Where Goods of This City May Be Seen.

The indications are that the hardware convention and exhibition of articles made in London, which opens here on Feb. 7, will be one of the greatest of its kind ever held in this part of Canada, and the biggest and best ever held in London.

The entire space of the city hall arcade and the hall upstairs will be used by exhibitors from all over the country. The passenger association has granted special rates, and it is expected that more than 500 retailers and travellers from all over Canada will be present.

The Banquet.

The banquet to be tendered the members of the Retail Hardware Association by the hardware manufacturers and jobbers of the city, is expected to be one of the greatest social events ever held by Canadian businessmen. Hon. Frank Cochrane will be unable to attend, but his place has been filled by C. C. James, deputy minister of agriculture. Mr. James will outline what the Ontario Government is doing to increase the knowledge and better the condition of the farming population.
