The dealers are not getting a great deal of butter, and with the cows on the grasslook for increased deliveries next week The decrease in price is not expected to the more than a cent or half a cent. At present creamery is quoted at 28c to 30c a pound, while the wholesale dealers are paying 26c for rolls.

Eggs Are Firm. Eggs have been very firm all week, selling at 21c by the single dozen. The wholesalers have been paying 19½c per dozen, and an increase to 20c was looked for before the end of the week, but this has failed to materialize. Eggs are fairly plentiful, and the wholesale dealers expect to get 19c next week.


