

Aylward returns on Friday from Buf-Interesting Address on Incidents of American Civil War by Inspector Edwards.

ng of the London Schoolmasters' Club yesterday afternoon. Edwards was the speaker, and gave a most interesting address on "General Robert E. Lee." After giving a very masterly survey of the early days of nection therewith, he went on to dis-cuss the last dramatic chapter of that struggle, when after Gettysburg, the supreme effort of the confederacy, the Southern army made its last gallant stand. It was an evidence of the great belief in Lee, said the speaker, that this great defeat did not in any way cause his soldiers to lose faith in him. The speaker described graphically the terrible sufferings of the winter of man, six feet tall, and weigh nearly 1863 to 1864, and showed how Lee had in every detail shared the sufferings in every detail shared the sufferings of the common soldier.
