GEN. R. E. LEE'S BRAVE BUT HOPELESS BATTLES

Interesting Address on Incidents
of American Civil War by
Inspector Edwards.

There was a very large attendance at the assembly-room of the Collegiate Institute on the occasion of the meeting of the London Schoolmasters' Club yesterday afternoon. Inspector Edwards was the speaker, and gave a most interesting address on "General Robert E. Lee." After giving a very masterly survey of the early days of the Civil War and General Lee's connection therewith, he went on to discuss the last dramatic chapter of that struggle, when after Gettysburg, the supreme effort of the confederacy, the Southern army made its last gallant stand. It was an evidence of the great belief in Lee, said the speaker, that this great defeat did not in any way cause his soldiers to lose faith in him. The speaker described graphically the terrible sufferings of the winter of 1863 to 1864, and showed how Lee had in every detail saved the sufferings of the common soldier. Then on May 2 there began Grant's systematic effort to "hammer" the south, where Lee with 62,000 men had to face Grant with 147,000, in one almost continuous battle till June 1, during which time the Wilderness, Chancellorsville, Spotsylvania and Cold Harbor, at which place Grant lost 10,000 men in an hour's fighting, gained a sanguinary fame, ending finally with the siege of Petersburg, where after a gallant siege, Lee had to flee with only 8,000 of his remaining 26,000 men able to carry a musket.

Lee's Surrender.

The speaker passed lightly over the final surrender at Appomattox, and went on to tell of Lee's quiet acceptance of the inevitable, and how he urged the confederacy to make the best of the new conditions. Lee was finally made president of the Washington Lee University, but died shortly after the war in 1870.

ONTARIO SENDS CASH TO WORTHY IMMIGRANTS

May Also Advance Money to
Help Bring Over Good
Class of Servants.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, Feb. 23.—Introduced in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. Dr. Reaume, minister of public works, the salary of the chairman of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway is increased from \$2,500 to \$5,000. This action is undertaken in recognition of the good services which the singlehanded has done the Province as head of the Temiskaming commission.

Immigration was the chief topic discussed at yesterday afternoon's sitting of the House went into committee of supply. Hon. Mr. Duff explained the details of the votes for colonization and immigration. One item, he said, which had not been changed for many years, was that of \$10,000 to agents and organizations, including the Salvation Army, to assist in securing for Ontario farm laborers and domestic servants. The estimates included \$2,000 for immigration work in Great Britain and Ireland, while J. W. Rieby was allowed \$175 toward his expenses in connection with the work in Ireland. Last year, said Mr. Duff, the Salvation Army had brought out 1,500 farm laborers and domestics. The Government did not claim that all these immigrants stayed on the farms, but the singlehanded did. The Salvation Army was bringing out a good class of men and women.

This year, said the minister, a special effort was being made by the Government to relieve the existing stringency of labor. The Government had decided to give a bonus of \$5 for each domestic servant brought to Ontario by the Salvation Army or any other agency. The subsidy of the domestics had to be passed upon by Mr. Donald Sutherland, of the colonization department, or by Miss Fitzgibbon, the Hon. the Minister of Education.

As for farm laborers, it had been found that there was a splendid class of men who were only deterred from coming to Ontario on short notice by the lack of ready cash. To meet this difficulty, the Government had decided to advance \$20 toward the passage money of each suitable farm laborer.

This money would be repaid to the Government by the immigrant, a lien being put on his wages. Such money would be well spent, said Mr. Duff, especially as it would practically all come back to the Province.

Dr. Jessop (Lincoln) asked if any medical inspection was made before the immigrants left England, so as to avoid the trouble and hardship of persons crossing the ocean, only to be sent back because of disease.

Hon. Mr. Duff answered that the medical inspection was in the hands of the Dominion government, which was taking rigid steps to see that diseased immigrants did not land in Canada.

Studholme Opposes.

Mr. Studholme, the Labor member, to whom the assistance of immigration is a matter of great importance, was only for an hour in criticism of the proposed grants. He denounced the whole system of bonusing, or of importing laborers who soon deserted the farms to swell the population of the cities. As a wage-earner he was against all bonusing.

Hon. Mr. MacKay agreed with Mr. Studholme that the majority of the immigrants refused to stay on the farm.

Sir James Whitney stated that Mr. Studholme was always to be found objecting to any aid or bounty to the immigrants, and he was very much surprised to find him in the main benefit from immigration, said the Premier, went to the Dominion Government for every immigrant coming to Ontario added to the Province's expenditure, but did not add one cent to the revenues. From the standpoint of the Provincial Government, much could be said both for and against immigration. The maintaining of Ontario's office in the Strand served the double purpose of securing immigrants and advertising Ontario. Sir James answered the criticism regarding the payment of \$2,500 to the Ontario agent by pointing out that other agents got vastly bigger salaries. The New Zealand agent-general receiving \$15,000 salary and \$10,000 for expenses. Under the B. N. A. act, Ontario could not have an agent-general, who would deal directly with the colonial office. The Ontario office would be a headquarters for the Minister of Agriculture and his officials, who should visit London at least once a year, while its facilities would also be at the disposal of all visiting Canadians.

For the past year, said the Premier, the Government had been aware of the acuteness of the situation as regards domestic servants, and was prepared to do all possible to cope with the question. In the course of the next few weeks additional sums might be asked for, to assist in bringing out good servants. The Government was considering the advisability of advancing the whole or part of the passage money of domestic servants.

Hon. Mr. Duff said that every precaution was taken regarding the bonuses for domestic servants.

Hon. Mr. MacKay said the Province was not doing enough to assist the farmers and the women of the Province. He asked why domestic servants

Hon. Mr. Duff replied that the Government was taking steps to secure good immigrants from these countries.

Hon. Mr. MacKay gave notice of the following resolution, which in the opinion of this House, the Province, and the municipalities should unite in (a) the establishment of craft or trade schools in the towns and cities of Ontario, to supplement the practical training of the workshop; (b) in an arrangement as to the basis of support for such schools between the Province, the municipalities and interested manufacturers; (c) the establishment in large industrial centres of technical high schools, and that the powers of the municipalities should be enlarged, so as to enable them to aid in the support of such schools.

MR. HAYS MAY SAY SOMETHING IMPORTANT

Track Elevation Speculation Is
Again Ripe in London.

Mr. Chas. M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk, will be one of the guests of honor at the board of trade banquet to be held in the third week in April, as stated in last evening's Advertiser. Any day during the week will be satisfactory to Mr. Hays, who has expressed his willingness to be present.
