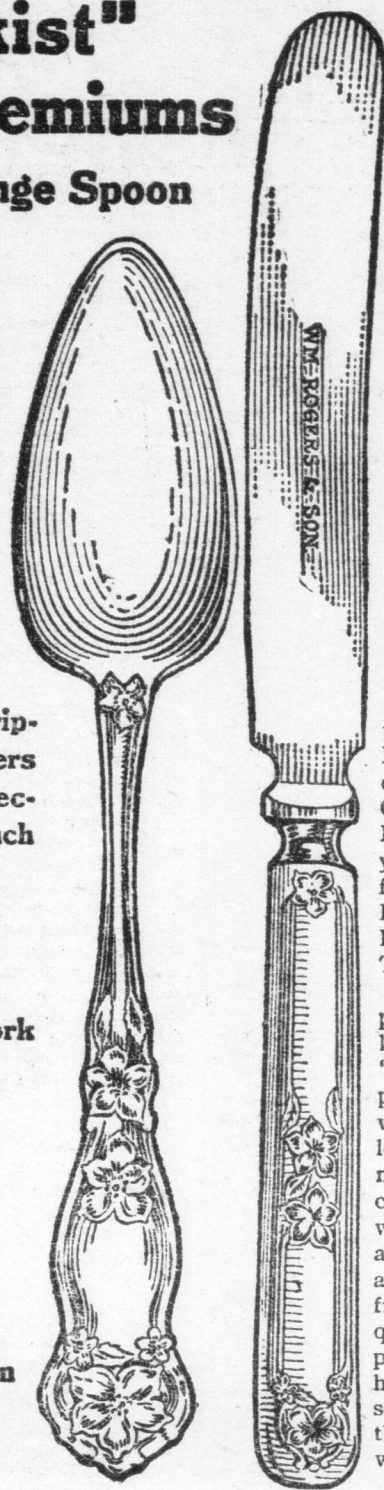

CHURCHILL'S WIFE WILL GO WITH HIM

Will Accompany Husband to Danger Zone at Belfast.

IS SPEAKING IN A TENT

Orangemen and Unionists Will Hold a Rival Meeting—Heated Protest From Churchmen.

London, Feb. 1.—The rival camps in Belfast are awaiting Feb. 8 with anxious expectancy. "Churchill for Paradise" is today's ironical headline on Belfast newspapers. "Paradise" is the name of the playing field of the Celtic football club. A tent which will accommodate 4,000 people is being erected there.

Mr. Winston Churchill, having been denied access to Ulster Hall, will make a mid-day speech from the platform in and on the field where the champion boxers give displays. As a counter-move, the Unionist Council is issuing circulars to the Orange lodges and Unionist clubs throughout Ulster, summoning the local Orangemen to assemble for a simultaneous anti-Churchill demonstration at the Northern agricultural show grounds in Belfast.

The Government, realizing the grave danger of a conflict between these excited rival forces, are introducing, as quietly as possible, next week, large numbers of cavalry and infantry, and also police, who are being gradually augmented day by day in batches of

fifty or thereabouts, drafted from country districts, with which it is intended to make an overwhelming display of force along the dividing lines of the Nationalist and Unionist quarters.

Mr. Churchill will be accompanied by his charming young wife, herself the daughter of a soldier, and is expected to leave his train at a station outside of Belfast and enter the city by a back door, and proceed to the meeting without passing through the Orange quarter. He has abandoned his intention to inspect Belfast harbor and will proceed to Scotland and London by the midnight train.

Protest From Churchmen. How inflamed public feeling is shown by the action of the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of Ireland, which issues a manifesto declaring home rule would "surrender the Protestant minority to an admittedly murderous ascendancy and would supply the Jesuits with a new lever for promoting civil and international war, in order to further the development of their fatal power and the corruption, humiliation and destruction of Protestant Britain."

The Liberal and Nationalist attitude in reply is expressed in the Daily Chronicle, which says: "Experience is a good teacher. We must not take Ulster's violent language too seriously. It is a way they have in the north of Ireland. All the same, these ebullitions reveal a very unlovely spirit, which assuredly is not the spirit of Protestantism, for the spirit of Protestantism is liberty."

ST. KITTS LIBEL SUIT. St. Catharines, Feb. 1.—M. J. McCarron, solicitor for ex-City Engineer D. B. Benzie, announced today that the libel action against ex-Mayor J. McBride will be gone on with at March assizes. The action against the Journal has been dropped. Mr. Benzie was retired from the city's service following charges of irregularity made by the former mayor in connection with paving contracts.

BOOM AT ST. KITTS. St. Catharines, Feb. 1.—The new high level bridge proposition and talk of St. Catharines being linked east and west with electric railways has started a big real estate boom here. The Garden-City Realty Company has purchased a block on James street next to the Ellis House, for a big figure, and also a block occupied by Mahaffy brothers at double the price the property sold for four years ago. Efforts are also being made to purchase the St. Catharines House and International Hotel.

KILLED ON TRACKS. Sherbrooke, Que., Feb. 1.—Noel Brechette was killed this morning while walking on the tracks here of the Quebec Central Railway. He leaves a wife and five children.

FERRY TO HAMILTON. Hamilton, Feb. 1.—Chairman Hope, of the parks board, is trying to induce the Toronto Ferry Company to send some of its boats here next summer and give a service on Hamilton Bay. If it agrees the city will purchase Oaklands Park, on the north shore, and establish a big summer resort over there, in conjunction with the syndicate which has purchased \$600,000 worth of land for residential purposes.

BETTER "SOAK HIM" SAYS LORDSHIP'S DAD

Father of Boddington, Actress's Wooer, Wants His Son in the Chain Gang.

Los Angeles, Feb. 1.—My coat-of-arms adorns the oldest castle walls in all England. By the way, lend me two dollars, will you, old chap?—Lord Boddington-Pitzgerald.

I hope he gets six months on the chain gang.—H. D. Boddington, sen. Debts and worthless checks amounting to probably more than \$10,000 are all that remain to remind Los Angeles of Norman Boddington, the mercurial young bon vivant and self-styled British nobleman and his efforts to capture the heart of Myrtle Dingwall, the young actress.

Warrants for Boddington's arrest have been issued on complaint of Chas. L. Hagelos, manager of the Angelus Taxicab Company, and others, but his largest financial "coup" is beyond the shadow of the law.

Borrowed Thousands. Employees of the Westinghouse Electrical Company are apparently the largest losers by Boddington's "charming personality." Besides collecting several thousand dollars on an orange grove near Whittier, over which his fellow employees had given him power of attorney, Boddington borrowed promiscuously from his conferees. Officers of the Westinghouse Company estimate his debts as amounting to several thousand dollars.

Besides the Angelus Hotel Company, the Angelus Taxicab Company, Me Kee's restaurant, Levy's restaurant, with which "Lord" Boddington cashed checks which were returned from the Security Savings Bank, there are numerous other taxicab companies, haberdasheries, restaurants, jewelers, etc., which claim to have souvenirs of the young Englishman in the form of slips of paper bearing his signature.

Vowed To Win Actress. Boddington had vowed to Carl Hagan, a fellow employee of the Westinghouse Company that he would win the heart of Myrtle Dingwall at all costs. He thereupon moved his trunks to the Angelus hotel from his friend's house and ordered that

taxicab company to keep a machine always at his disposal.

According to the statements of several of the drivers for the taxicab company at the Angelus, Boddington became acquainted with Miss Dingwall almost six weeks ago, and for more than a month before his departure for points unknown on Dec. 16 he had taken her riding every night after the performance at the Grand Theatre.

During many of these rides, say the drivers, Miss Dingwall was fed chocolates from his dining table. Both the Miss Dingwall, however, stoutly maintains that she knew the young man but slightly and rode with him seldom.

Declared Himself Engaged. Boddington did not hesitate to tell of his vow that he would win the heart of the actress. Before leaving Los Angeles he told several of his friends that they were engaged and would be married on his return from London.

Upon his note paper appeared a crest with his full name and the legend, "Sine labor non est gloria." Both the motto and the branch of the Westinghouse Company, stated that he had known Boddington's father personally as an estimable man.

Until now the hotelmen and others who had accepted Boddington's checks had clung to the slips of paper in the hope that his father might settle the bills. The following message from the father hurried them to the district attorney's office and the Thiel Detective Agency:

"No, I will not make good any checks for my son. I only hope they catch him. He is only eighteen years old, but he has more wickedness in him than any boy I know of for his age. I hope he gets at least six months on the chain gang; that's the best thing that could happen to him. No, I do not think he has gone to England. He would get a hotter reception there than he would get here.

STARTS A CLASS IN LORE OF MATRIMONY

Couples Receive Instruction On Buying Furniture, Cooking and Courting.

Kansas City, Feb. 2.—Marriages may be made in heaven, but Rev. W. J. Dalton, of the Church of the Annunciation, believes they are facilitated by having branch matrimonial agencies right here on earth.

In that belief he has established a branch at his church, at Linwood and Benton Boulevards, and at present he has some 50 couples in training for double happiness, and the branch has only been open about a month. Father Dalton is conducting his matrimonial class openly, frankly and under that very name. His object is to marry the young people of his congregation, and he tells them so. He does not insist that John shall marry Mary, or that Jennie shall marry William, but he has told John and Mary, and Jennie and William, and all the rest, that the quicker they settle it for themselves the quicker they will be rid of having him after them with a sharp stick.

Father Dalton called the young people together about a month ago and told them that any man of 23 or 24 who was making \$65 a month should take a wife, and that any girl of 18 or 19 should take a husband. Early marriages and large families, he told them, were to be the cardinal rules of a society he proposed to form. And he formed the society right then and there, and every one of the young men and women present was enrolled as a member on the spot.

The guild is a month old now, has a membership of about 100, and meets every week. There have been no marriages yet, and Father Dalton does not want them yet. At present he is delivering weekly lectures on matrimony, on buying furniture, on cooking, on saving money, on rearing children and on courting.

Father Dalton says the department house is destroying the American home, and that girls and boys reared in these rented, steam-heated, furnished-by-contract quarters grow up without knowing the struggle and joy of building a real home. He also says that no home is a corner that supports a corner drug store, a corner bakery and a corner cleaning and dyeing establishment.

While the matrimonial class was instituted chiefly to serve the Church of the Annunciation, Father Dalton says the latest stir is out for any who are looking for helpful hints.

HENSALL CITIZENS WANT NEW TOWN HALL

Matter Will Be Gone Into By Council at Meeting On Monday Evening.

[Special To The Advertiser.] Hensall, Feb. 2.—At the regular meeting of the council to be held on Monday evening next, the question of building a fine new town hall will be gone into thoroughly. There is a very strong feeling among local people that Hensall should have a building that will be a credit to the town, and it is expected that while the councillors are at the matter they will see that a first-class building is erected.

Local businessmen are keenly interested in the proposal of the Goderich Board of Trade to tax mail order houses, and some action may be taken here towards furthering the matter. Hensall sidewalks are in a terrible condition as a result of the very heavy snowfalls, and the carelessness of people in not keeping them properly cleaned. It has been suggested that an appeal be made to Mayor Spotton of Wingham to come to Hensall and do here as he did there.

David McLean, whose death occurred in London recently, was widely known all through this district. He was one of the early settlers in Kippen district, and was most progressive in his views. Mr. McLean was 62 years of age. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon at Ross Cemetery, Brucefield, after services had been conducted in St. Andrew's Church at Kippen.

CHARGED WITH BIGAMY.

St. Catharines, Feb. 1.—Edwin Terry, a Toronto man, is held here on a charge of bigamy. He was found living at 84 Church street, Toronto, with a woman formerly named Minnie Freeman. Rev. Robert Kerr married them November last, the police say. Terry was remanded for the week. Daniel Sayers, an aged man, who married his housekeeper, Beth Lambert, his first wife being alive in Sault Ste. Marie, will be sentenced on Tuesday.

A TUG COLLAPSED.

Hamborn, Germany, Feb. 1.—A tug loaded with workmen capsized in a collision with a freighter while crossing the Rhine here this morning, and eight of the passengers were drowned. The helmsman was unable to see the oncoming freighter on account of a heavy snowstorm.

FILMS AND THE EYE.

Toronto, Feb. 1.—Dr. Noble, of the Toronto board of education, is of the opinion that many cases of defective eyesight in the ranks of the public school pupils of the city, are due to the strain of watching moving pictures, and will introduce a motion at tonight's meeting for a thorough investigation. He purposes having either the medical health officer of the city or the chief medical inspector of the public school board, conduct the investigation, but he has not disclosed what action he thinks the board should take in the matter. It is the opinion of Dr. Noble that the practice of watching moving pictures is also harmful to the eyes of adults.
