The lecture was highly appreci-
ated by all.
Mrs. Hughes and Mrs. Colon Smith
were present, a deputation from the
Mothers' Club, to urge the necessity of
a curfew bell in the city, as a help in
keeping young children off the streets
as playgrounds at night. The teach-
ers will co-operate in this movement.
Rev. J. G. Inkster's departure from
the city, as a valued member of the
board of education, was deeply regret-
ted, and the secretary of the guild was
instructed to forward to him the fol-
lowing resolution:

MOTORISTS SAY
LAW IS UNFAIR
London Men Will Discuss Stop-
ping of Motors Alongside
Street Cars.

THE WORK OF THE YEAR
Contributions Were Made to Good
Roads at Pottersburg and at
Port Stanley.

A proposed amendment to the city
of London traffic bylaw, whereby the
clause compelling the halting of motor
cars overtaking standing street cars
would be eliminated was discussed at a
meeting of the executive of the London
and Western Motor Club last
night at the Tecumseh Hotel.
The matter will be brought before a
general meeting of the club members
at the board of trade rooms Monday
night, when it is expected that quite
a discussion on the road regulations
will develop.
While certain members claim that it
is a hardship to be compelled to stop
behind every standing street car, es-
pecially in the business section, where
it is sometimes difficult to turn out to
the left side for fear of conflicting with
opposite traffic, others coincide with
the spirit of the law.
In overtaking and passing a street
car on the left side, there is some-
times danger of colliding with a car
on the other track, but some motorists
hold that the law affords necessary
protection to the public and is neces-
sary to the chauffeur. Consequently,
there may not be unanimity in further-
ing the amendment.

Times For Discretion.
There are times, however, when dis-
cretion should be used in the enforce-
ment of the law. At Dundas and
Richmond streets and other points
where street railway crews change
shifts, long waits might sometimes be
necessary before a motorist could pro-
ceed, as it has been found that these
changes are not always made punctu-
ally.
However, there are few complaints
when halts are made only for cars
"that are stationary for the purpose of
taking on or discharging passengers,"
as the law states.

In some cities autos are permitted to
pass street cars on the right side of the
road, but this practice is not to be
followed here.

A Luncheon.
The discussion took place after a
luncheon, tendered the members of the
club by President J. M. Moore, C.E.
Efforts will be put forward to have a
number of permanent pavements con-
structed in London this year to ob-
viate some of the bad road difficulties
that have worried persons in charge of
horse-drawn and motor vehicles for
years.

The club has secured affiliation with
the Ontario Motor League, which or-
ganization is created along a systematic
line for the general good of motordom.
Road signs were furnished and erected
designating the proper routes between
certain points and bad curves, dan-
gerous grades, and railway crossings
were marked with proper signals.

License Reciprocity.
The league is now endeavoring to
secure license reciprocity between On-
tario and adjoining provinces, and
states that the benefit for tourists, this
year is being persisted in, and it is
hoped that good results will be ob-
tained.

The O. M. L. has also been active in
preventing the enactment of laws cal-
culated to restrict the rights of motor-
ists; pressure was brought to bear by
which the speed limit was increased
from ten and fifteen miles an hour in
city and county respectively to fifteen
and twenty miles; good roads bylaws
have been instigated and supported;
members have assisted to the best of
their ability in providing outtings for
innates of charitable institutions;
main thoroughfares have been
cleared with a degree of success; scouts
have been placed on country highways
to prevent the operation by county
constables of speed traps, which are
held to be unfair; and many other
things have been accomplished.

gregation Held Annual Meet-

Davis, and latterly Mr. W. Flowers, has
been very successful, and has an av-
erage attendance of 25.
Sunday School Report.
The Sunday school secretary, Mr.
Arthur Jones, presented his report
which was, as usual, interesting and
encouraging. The enrollment is 122,
with an average attendance for 1912 of
87. The receipts totalled \$121.54. The
school has excellent staff of teach-
ers and officers, and under the direc-
tion of Mr. Carlyle Webster, their new
superintendent, a steady and substan-
tial growth is anticipated.

Two new members were elected to
the board of managers, Messrs. John
Anderson and John Moule.
The question of a new organ was
discussed at some length, and it was
unanimously decided that a new one
be purchased, the different departments
all pledging themselves to contribute
towards the organ fund.

Votes of thanks were passed to Mrs.
W. Hawthorne and Mrs. C. Jones for
their splendid services to the church
as organists.
