OPPOSITION TO MOVE LACK OF CONFIDENCE

Tokio, Japan, Feb. 6.—A resolution of want of confidence in the Japanese government, in connection with its attitude concerning the alleged receipt of illicit commissions for influencing the allotment of admiralty contracts in favor of a German firm, is to be moved in the Japanese Diet on February 10 by members of the Opposition. This decision was reached today at a mass meeting organized by the Opposition parties, and attended by 15,000 people.

RESURRECTION WILL REVEAL TRUE LIFE

Rev. Father Nolan Tells a Big Audience How It Will Strip Off Hypocrite's Mask.

An audience of about twelve hundred men heard an address on the "General Judgment," by Rev. Father Nolan in St. Peter's Cathedral last night. The speaker chose as a text Matthew 25, verses 31 and 32. A feature of the service was the congregational singing, joined heartily.

Father Nolan spoke of the resurrection of the body and the final sentence which affects the total separation of the sinner from the face of his Maker.

"The just shall rise to glory and the reprobate shall fall to corruption," he said. "After the resurrection, all shall assemble in the great valley of Jehosaphat for Christ shall reward the good and punish the wicked."

With dramatic emphasis, the preacher showed how each man would stand before the whole world to give an account of his whole life.

"The mask of the hypocrite will be thrown off and his sins, secret and public, will be manifest to the whole world. The abandonment of the drunkard and the lecherous will appear in all their heinousness. The unjust, the un-Godly and the irreligious may seemingly triumph in life, but God being eternal, can wait for the day of virtue which will triumph over vice and Satan."

"It is in heaven where the just will meet God, face to face, and know him as he is known. The reprobate souls in their blackest despair, are sent to their doom of everlasting punishment."

COUNT CHARGED WITH STARTLING REMARK

But Russian Denies He Made Incriminating Statement.

Budapest, Hungary, Feb. 6.—"Russia will not demobilize her army until the Russian flag floats over the Carpathians." This was one of the startling statements attributed to Count Vladimir Bobrinsky, president of the Russian Constitutional Conservative party in the Duma, and leader of the Pan-Slavic movement in Russia, when the trial was resumed today at Marmaros-Siget of the 94 Ruthens, charged with inciting to rebellion against the Austro-Hungarian government.

Dullakovic, a detective, was on the witness stand giving evidence. He put the sensational phrase into Count Bobrinsky's mouth.

Count Denies.
Count Bobrinsky was immediately recalled to the witness stand where he emphatically denied that he ever made the incriminating statement attributed to him. He admitted he had consorted with Dullakovic, but his agents had warned him against the detective. The court gave Count Bobrinsky permission to return to Russia when he had concluded his evidence.

Interest in Trial.
The trial has been in progress since December 9. Great political interest has been aroused throughout Europe by the proceedings.
