THE FARM LABOR PROBLEM.

If one goes to the bottom of the matter we think that it will be found that the principal reason why men are not attracted to the farm is that they consider the amount of wages paid are altogether out of proportion to the labor re quired. Security of tenure is another element which enters into the matter. On either side engagements do not appear to be binding, and men come and go at their own sweet will or are cast back into the cities if found unsuitable.

WINDSOR, Sept. 8 .- Menaced un in the hand of a bandit, Mrs. Allen wife of George Allen, caretaker at the track of the Windsor Jockey Club, today saved her husband \$6,000 by quick thinking. CALLING TENDERS FOR NEW PROVINCIAL LOAN

TORONTO, Sept. 8. — Provincial Treasurer Smith will advertise immediately for tenders on his new loan. Contrary to original announcement which heralded a \$15,000,000 loan, the amount to be sought is only \$10,000,000. atthough these figures may be somewhat increased if the offerings are favorable. The new loan is to be twenty year, six per cent venture into the markets.

For the most part the new money is required to retire treasury bonds issued in April last, and a little of it for hydro expenditures. The ten million figure, however, is one which is hardly likely to carry the province could probably curtail its expenditures considerably. 
