

Mayor's Salary Is Only One Cut At City Hall Thus Far

ONE salary cut and two salaries raised, seems to be the sum total of the salary adjustment so far made this year at the city hall, though there has been a lot of talk

of salary-cutting.

The salary cut is that of Mayor Cameron Wilson. The mayor's allowance for office expense, that's the way it is put, is \$2,000. The mayor ordered the city treasurer to deduct 10 per cent off his salary, or allowance, which will mean that this year the mayor will draw \$1.800.

The two salaries raised are those of the plumbing inspect Mr. Young, and a young clerk in the assessment department named Ashton.

The assessment department has jumped the mayor's as-sessment so much that whereas three years ago his taxes were \$150, this year he is facing a bill for \$450. His assessment is now \$9,000, as against \$4,000 three years ago.
