SECRETS OF ACCURACY.

The strength of a chain is its weakest link. Similarly, the soundness of the game of golf must be judged by his or her weakest shot. This weakness may be a tendency to hook or slice. It may be lack of length from the drive. It may be inability to stop the ball with a mashie; it may be defective putting—in fact, it may be any one of the hundreds of mistakes which a golfer can make. Which ever it is, now is the time to strengthen the weak link. The season is well under way, there is little time for practice, and he or she who hopes to do well in the forthcoming events should now reflect over the way he or she played during the last season.

If we are all really honest with ourselves, there will hardly be one of us who will not be obliged to admit that a certain type of shot was occasionally letting us down. A player may play several rounds, without requiring this particular stroke, but such a blissful state of affairs cannot continue forever, and the original equipment of the club will be a constant reminder of the weakness which will make itself evident.

Again, there is the opportune moment to break in a new club, and thus its predecessor. Many players carry around a club which they seldom use. When it is handed out by an experienced caddy as the right club for the shot, the owner will remark: "No, I can't use that club. I'll have to take the —" or words to that effect.

PROVINCIAL CHAPTER CERTAIN FOR QUEBEC

National I. O. D. E. Convention Hears Interesting Reports From Officers.

Quebec, June 13.—Provincial organization in Quebec in connection with the work of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire is a thing to which chapters in the province may look forward in the future, according to Mrs. A. H. Macdonald, national organizing secretary, who in her report presented yesterday at session of the annual meeting, said that the only thing that now remained in order to complete such organization, was the arrival at a decision regarding the location of a provincial headquarters.

"It is hoped," said Mrs. Macdonald, "that early in the autumn the provincial chapter of Quebec will formally assume its place with the sister chapters of the other provinces," adding the information that this would complete provincial organization in Canada for some time at least.

Reports presented by the national secretary, Mrs. W. B. Hopkins, from the National Executive Committee, Mrs. W. H. Barker, and from the national treasurer, Miss Eldred MacDonald, were encouraging. The treasurer's statement for the year showed receipts amounting to \$337,716.93, disbursements, including war memorial and educational fund expenditures, \$27,488.60, leaving a balance on hand of \$310,228.33. Much of the time of the afternoon meeting was taken up with the reading of reports from the provincial chapters, four of which were given before the meeting adjourned. Mrs. A. U. D. Depencier presented the report of the provincial chapter of British Columbia; Mrs. M. L. Johnson of Lethbridge, the report of the Alberta chapter; Mrs. David Ballantyne, Saskatchewan; and Mrs. Colin Campbell, Manitoba. Mrs. Depencier's report contained an interesting reference to Nipmish chapter, which had put out a booklet with 15,000 men of Icelandic origin who served in the great war. This undertaking entailed expense amounting to \$10,000. The book is now on the market. In the report of the two western provinces was included, in addition to relief and educational work, which is common to all provinces, the planting of large numbers of trees, which serve in some cases as memorials.

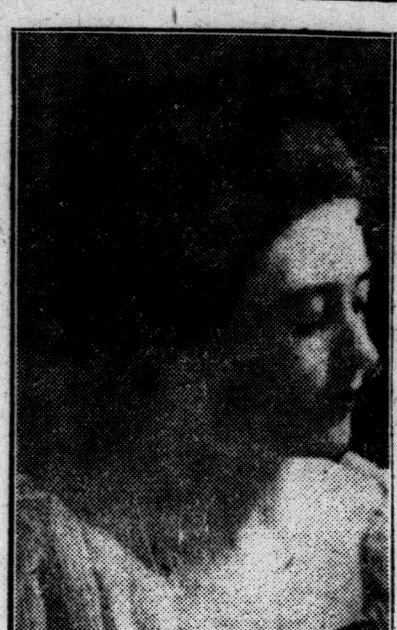
HOLY NAME MEN CONVENT AT LOGAN PARISH CHURCH
