

HOUSE, SCHOOL PLANNED FOR NURSES' QUARTERS

Estimated Cost For Two Years Will Be in Neighborhood of \$4,000.

OPERATING ROOM

School Board Provides Hitch, Asking Fifty Dollars Per Month Rent.

At a special meeting of the Hospital Trust held in Victoria Hospital last night the most important item dealt with was accommodation for the class of nurses which will enter the hospital for training in the next few weeks. After much deliberation it was decided to build a new building for the class of nurses, and the Colborne Street School as temporary quarters, also if possible to acquire the old McClary home on Wellington street for two years and use this as a dormitory.

Both places will have to be remodelled extensively, and the matter of spending the money to fix these places brought considerable discussion from the members. It was estimated that if both places were taken for a period of two years that the total expense for the two years would be \$4,000. If the building can be obtained for a shorter period, it will not be necessary for a longer lease on the building.

These two places will accommodate 45 nurses, 15 in the school building and 30 in the McClary home. It is positively necessary that more accommodation be added, for at the present time the hospital is off the list of standardized hospitals, and this does not permit the nurses graduating from Victoria to go to New York State to practice.

The only hitch in the renting of these buildings is the rent wanted by the board of education for the school. They ask \$50 a month, but the hospital trust was of the opinion that the lower fee should be asked by the board. As the building is not in use at the present time, they would be helping to defray the expenses of up-keep on the building.

The proposal for a subway to be constructed between the administration building and the isolation wards was discussed, but tabled until next meeting to give Engineers near an opportunity to prepare new plans. It was shown in the plans before last night's meeting that the subway

Horses At Work Stung To Death By Bee Swarm

Canadian Press Despatch. St. Hyacinthe, Que., Aug. 26.—Three horses employed in moving loads of gravel were killed today on the high road between St. Damase and Rougemont, near here, when thousands of bees settled on the animals and literally stung them to death. The horses were completely covered by the bees and, maddened by the stings, tried to kick themselves loose from the heavy wagons. The harness was eventually severed by knives and the animals, too weakened to bolt, were sprinkled with poison to get rid of the bees. They died shortly afterwards.

DRAFT PACT OPPOSED BY NORWAY AND SPAIN

REBELS OF SUDAN GET PRISON TERM

Three Ringleaders Get Two Year Sentence As Result of Outbreak.

PUNISH TEN OTHERS

Associated Press Despatch. Khartoum, Egypt, Aug. 26.—A court-martial, composed entirely of Egyptians and Sudanese, has sentenced the three ringleaders in the disturbances, which occurred recently at Atbara, to two years' imprisonment. Ten others of the prisoners were each sentenced to one year's imprisonment.

British official despatches regarding the disturbance at Atbara said the trouble there started August 5 when military cadets, who had paraded with rifles, refused to give up their arms on returning to their school, and they were surrounded and arrested by British troops.

The following day the Egyptian railway battalion at Atbara made a demonstration, after which the Egyptian soldiers were confined to barracks. During the demonstration they attacked the British troops with bricks and other missiles, and the British soldiers fired, causing 15 casualties.
