

## WILSON IS GIVEN A BRIEF RESPIRE

Notorious Bandit, Formerly of London, Taken From Penitentiary to Jail.

### ESCAPE FEARED

Herbert L. Wilson, former London mission worker, described by Los Angeles newspapers as "arch criminal," confessed mail robber and prisoner at San Quentin on a conviction of murder, is now having a short respite from his life term in the penitentiary. This information was received this morning by Inspector of Detectives Thomas Nickle, of the local police force.

Wilson is being held incommunicado in the Pasadena city jail, and yesterday testified for the American government in a mail robbery trial. Wilson's transfer from the state penitentiary of California to the jail was surrounded with the utmost secrecy, according to Los Angeles newspapers. Every safeguard was taken against reported intentions of underworld enemies of Wilson to "square accounts" with him.

At the same time every precaution was taken against possible attempt at a rescue of the notorious criminal by former associates in a bandy who were reported to be ready to take desperate chances to effect his freedom.

Having confessed to the planning and directing of the planning of two mail trucks in Los Angeles on March 3 and Nov. 3, 1921, Wilson appeared in court today as chief witness against Jack Elrick, former American, who was reported to be ready to take desperate chances to effect his freedom.

So notorious is Wilson's record for attempts at escape that Pasadena jail officials were by no means overjoyed at having the former Londoner in their custody for more than a week, a Los Angeles dispatch says.

An extra guard has been stationed about the jail to checkmate any move along this line.

Wilson lived in London about ten years ago. He was well-known throughout the city, having conducted the City Mission, on Richmond street, for several years.

## \$40,000 IS NEEDED FOR PLAYGROUNDS IN BEER ACTION

Commission Has to Rely On Generosity of the Council, Though—Big Program.

Though the public utilities commission may not ask the city council for an appropriation of \$40,000 for playgrounds purposes this year, nevertheless such a sum could be used to advantage by the commission.

In the midst of preparing estimates this morning, Manager E. V. Buchanan pointed out that the commission had been unable to do little or no construction work on the playgrounds last year, since the appropriation of \$20,000 passed by the council was barely to meet the costs of maintenance.

Mr. Buchanan drew attention to the fact that the commission had been successful, through the strictest measures of economy, in maintaining the present playgrounds system, and at the same time reducing the over-draft of \$8,300 carried over from 1923 to \$4,000.

Should the commission purchase a site in the north end of the city for the playground, approximately \$10,000 would be needed to provide the necessary equipment.

Improvements needed in order to have the playground meet the provincial requirements, would approximate \$10,000, embracing proper filtration plant, shower baths, lavatories, etc.

"We may be able to operate the pool again this year," the manager remarked, "but last year, the board of health may object, as the present pool certainly does not comply with the regulations of the provincial health relative to city swimming pools."

"Though department regulations are not satisfied by the present pool, the water is quite sterile owing to the high amount of chlorine used in the water."

The parks board has the legal right to request the council for parks and recreation to purchase a site for a new pool, but similar pools are not in operation, which, accordingly, has only to throw itself upon the generosity of the council in the matter.

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## Chicago Wheat Prices Fall

## CITY ANTIS WILL BUILD A CHURCH

Members of Knox Congregation Lead Drive to Segregate Adherents.

Plans for the formation of an anti-union Presbyterian church in South London were formulated at an informal meeting held last night of a number of the anti-unionist members of Knox Presbyterian church.

The purchase of residential property in the district is being considered by those interested in the plan. In fact, the residence of the late Col. Leys on Elmwood avenue may be the property finally selected to house the new church for a period of probably five years, when a new church edifice would be built.

In addition to the anti-unionist members of Knox church, it is hoped to draw members from St. Andrew's and First churches sufficient to raise the strength of the anti-union church to at least 300, and possibly 500 members.

A number of the anti-unionist members of Knox church, who recently resigned as such, are known to be behind the movement to form a new church. Developments are awaited with interest by the unionists and anti-unionists in South London.

## FUNDS INVOLVED IN NEW CHARGES

Presbyterian Church Association of Two Counties Meets Today.

A resolution of the Presbyterian church association of Middlesex and Elgin of Jan. 25 in which the association appointed a treasurer, and in which some of the unionists claim that the anti-unionists were "by inference" asked to withhold funds from their churches until June 10 came under heavy polemical fire and criticism at this morning's meeting of the London Presbytery.

This apical meeting was called to deal with the resignation of Rev. W. A. Leitch of Kintyre, which after some discussion he was persuaded to withdraw until June 10, in view of representations of his congregation that he stay until that date, and that of Rev. D. G. Paton of Glencoe.

Services of the Glencoe church attended the Presbytery, from both sides of the dispute. The union members claimed that this resolution of the church association had had some effect on their position in the church and had influenced them in withdrawing from the congregation.

Determined To Quit. They made it very plain that the unionists in the Glencoe church were determined to withdraw, and would do so at the earliest opportunity to the Methodist church "across the road" as one put it. He also stated that the minister, Rev. D. G. Paton would accompany them to the new union church.

Anti-unionist members of the congregation, on the other hand, claimed that the central union committee in London had been active in getting more members to secede from the church, and that this was the reason for the present split in the congregation.

Rev. Mr. McIntosh at this juncture asked for a definite answer to the question as to whether there had actually been any move by the union committee in London to incite any member of the Glencoe church to leave just now.

"This is a concrete case," he said, "where such an allegation is made and I want to have an answer to my question."

Deny Charges. Members of the unionist faction at Glencoe denied absolutely that there had been any such suggestion or request for secession from the London committee in answer to Rev. William Beattie of the First Presbyterian church here, who is chairman of that committee.

The resignation of Mr. Paton was moved by Rev. J. M. McGilvray after an hour of discussion, but a motion of adjournment coming at the same time prevented the motion being moved on. The presbytery took an hour and a half for lunch and consideration. Mr. Paton in his statement said that he felt that it was better that he should resign in view of the split in his congregation and in view of the difficulty in the matter of guarantee of stipend.

In the case of Mr. Leitch, the resignation given for resignation was a promise made before the union vote was taken in his congregation that he would resign in the event of the congregation voting against the union, which it did.

It was merely the fulfillment of a promise.

Both Mr. Lawrance and Mr. Mess made it clear that in favoring the setting aside of a much smaller sum than \$6,000 for this year, such action was favored by them, not because of the unfavorable comment which has appeared in the press recently from church clubs, Labor party and other organizations, but solely out of respect to the board's avowed policy of economy in confining this year's expenditures to only those things which are absolutely necessary.
