## THERAPY SOCIETY TO DECIDE ON CHILDREN'S AIDE TONIGHT

Would Help Little Patients Toward Health by Vocational Occupation.

MUST PAY SALARY

Friends Have Made Donations To Pay For Materials Necessary in Work.

That the children of the War Memorial Children's Hospital should have the services of a vocational aide to assist the doctors and nurses in bringing about a speedier cure, is the opinion of the members of the Occupational Therapy Society. The hospital trust has granted permission for an aide to be placed in the hospital, but has voted no money for the work.

Col. W. M. Gantshere and a number of friends, by generous contribution, has started a fund for the purchase of materials to be used by the aide in her work with the children. There only remains the salary of the aide to be paid, and the Occupational Therapy Society meets tonight to decide whether its members shall undertake the salary, and so make possible vocational therapy work among the children.

The character of the aide's work among the children would have to develop as she carries it on in the hospital. Just as the occupation of weaving baskets has been found helpful in bringing about a rapid cure in the case of adult patients, so similar work, but work such as the children could undertake, would be used to promote the speedier healing of their little bodies. With their minds fixed on the little tasks given them to do, they would forget about themselves and let nature and medicine take their course in making them better. The age of the child would be a factor in indicating what type of work should be taught by the aide.
