Unfairness to Millers. Some weeks ago a correspondent of The World sent us a letter, in which is was claimed that owing to the deficient wheat crop of 1888 in Canada, it was altogether ent crop that of 1883-4. These two years were the years in which the greatest amount of wheat was imported since Canada has been recognized as

a great wheat growing country. From a return brought down to the House of Commons shortly after the opening of the present session it is learned that during the six months ending Dec. 31, 1888, there were imported into the Dominion, entered for consumption, 9705 bushels of wheat and 154,896 barrels of flour, lent to a little over 700,000 bushels of wheat.
