Following is a review of the work of the trustees of the Massey Music Hall for the first year of the enterprise. A careful perusal of the same will show how the building has grown into popular favor and the efficiency of its management. The trustees have evidently done their best to meet the objects for which the hall was erected by the donor, Mr. H. A. Massey. It being the first year of the use of the hall, the management of the use of the hall, the management had to meet all the contingencies incident to an entirely new venture, and were somewhat handicapped at the outset by having to pay a loss incurred by the opening festival, amounting to \$548, and other unforeseen contingencies; and, in addition to this, they have not always received the hearty support of the public in connection with low-priced entertainments, in consequence of which heavy deficiencies were caused.

While the first year of the hall has been measurably successful there will be increased expenditures for the second year, the item of taxes alone will be considerably more than last year for the reason that the taxes of '94 were only for the half-year or since the occupancy of the building, and were upon an unfinished building.

The advantages that the people are to derive from the hall will be just what the people make them. The building is a gift to the people and is therefor the building in use for every laudable object

The trustees are now considering the advisability of placing a suitable organ in the hall, which it is hoped they may be able to accomplish by the co-operation of the people.
