\$5,000 See Murphy Win Indianapolis Auto Race In Record Time

Angelo Driver Goes 500 Miles in 5 Hours 17 Minutes and 30.79 Seconds; Hartz Is Second; Hearne Third and De Palma a Fourth

INDIANAPOLIS, May 30.—Leading start to finish, Jimmy Murphy, of Los Angeles, winner of the 1921 Grand Prix, carved his name in the hall of motor fame to-day when he flashed across the wire of the 500-mile automobile race in Indianapolis speedway before a break-breaking crowd of 135,000 spectators.

Murphy smashed all records for the race, clipping more than 16 minutes the best previous record. His time was 5 hours 17 minutes and 30.79 seconds, an average of 94.8 miles an hour, against the old record of 5:51, or 89.84 miles an hour, made by Ralph De Palma in 1916. Murphy's something which had never been accomplished before at the Indianapolis way, and, to the knowledge of experts, never before in a race for importance. He shot into the lead at the start and never relinquished it until the last lap, driving for three straight hours.

Los Angeles driver made only one stop during the entire 500 miles. The major honors went to Murphy, Hartz, also of Los Angeles, who second, drove a remarkable race, and De Palma, who was third, also making a desperate effort to catch Murphy. Hartz' time was 5:30:45.4, an average of 93.54 miles an hour, which was also far in advance of the record. Eddie Hearne, a veteran racer, piloted a French car to third place in 5:22:26.06, for an average of 93.04 miles an hour, while Ralph De Palma, one of the favorites, was fourth in 5:31:04.55, an average of 91.04 miles an hour.

Murphy was leading at the end of the 300-mile mark. He flashed into the lead at the start and retained it up to this, although officials previously announced that he momentarily lost it when he stopped two minutes at 185 miles to change four tires and replenish fuel. The error was made in the checking system. Murphy won \$5,000 in prize money.

The time for 300 miles was 3:10:24, an average of 94.54 miles an hour. Hartz was second, Ora Haabe third, and Eddie Hearne was fourth. The average for the same distance last year was 90.36 miles an hour. Ralph De Palma was in tenth place.

Murphy was nearly miles ahead of Hartz at 350 miles. The time was 3:42:51, an average of 94.23 miles an hour. This is a record for the track for the distance. Murphy made a stop for the distance.
