# Selling Cattle at Bargain Prices.

Kingston, Ont., Nov. 12.—A panic has struck the tarmers in the rear of Addiugton over the probable shortage of fodder, and there was a wholesale slaughter of stock, meat and hides being sold at most stock, meat and hides being sold at most ridiculously low prices- A farmer says more loss to stock has occurred unnecessarily than will take the next five years to redeem. Fodder is fairly plentiful and pasturage has been unusually good all fall, but high prices tempt the farmer to part with his fodder and sell his stock. Beaver hay sells at \$15 a ton and cows from \$5 to \$8 each. Who ever heard of the like before?

# Experimental Fruit Farm.

At the meetings of the fruit, vegetable and kindred organizations to be held this week in connection with the Horticulturweek in connection with the Horticultural Exhibition an advisory committee may be appointed to aid the Minister of Agriculture in the conduct of the new experimental fruit farm at Jordan, Welland county. He has suggested that this be done. The farm is rapidly assuming shape for practical work. Some ten and a half miles of drains have been put in, roads laid out, and the foundations of several necessary buildings are completed.
