

Mount Carmel New Hospice.

Falls View, Ont., July 1.—Some eighty years ago the Fathers of the Order of Our Lady of Mount Carmel established themselves here and founded a monastery and hospice. In a modest way they commenced their work in this district, erecting a little chapel or shrine, and in this holy place Catholics from all countries have worshipped. Twenty years ago the idea was conceived of the erection of a great hospice and chapel, in keeping with the importance and growth of the work which the Fathers were doing. At that time Archbishop Lynch, who strongly approved of the erection of such a place of worship and retreat, issued a pastoral letter, explaining the nature of the task undertaken, urging Catholics to support it, and saying:—

"The Fathers of the Order of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, the most ancient in the Church and dear to the heart of our Blessed Mother, have commenced this good work. Our holy Father Pius IX. has been graciously pleased to confer upon the present little Church plenary indulgences and other favors granted to the most ancient places of the old world. The Fathers also propose, when a suitable house is built, to receive prelates and clergy of the Church as well as laymen to make retreats; and to provide priests worn out in the service of their Divine Master with a home where they can quietly prepare for eternity.

"Missions will also be given in parishes by the religious at the request of the Bishops. A place more fitting for such an institution could hardly be found. God Himself has made the selection. It is easy of approach from all parts of the country, and on the confines of two great nations. We have full confidence that God will finish His own good work by inspiring the hearts that love Him and His Blessed Mother of Mount Carmel to contribute to the erection of a church and monastery there."

**NEW HOSPICE NOW COMPLETED.**  
Five years ago the corner-stone of the hospice was laid by Archbishop Walsh; two years ago the building was formally opened by Archbishop O'Connor, and the Hospice of Mount Carmel now stands completed.

To-day, on the invitation of Father A. J. Kredt, O.C.C., who is in charge of the hospice, a party of visitors inspected the buildings, and took dinner with the Superior. In the party were: Fr. M. German, M.P.P. for Wainfleet; Rev. Canon Mackenzie, Chippawa; Rev. Joh. Crayford, Niagara Falls; Messrs. A. C. Hastings, Mayor of Niagara Falls, N.Y.; W. P. Slater, Mayor of Niagara Falls, Ont.; T. Berriman, Reeve of Stamford; A. F. Crow, Niagara Falls, Ont.; T. F. Brown, Welland; Arthur Boyle, Collector of Customs, Niagara Falls, Ont.; James A. Lovell, Niagara Falls South; Charles C. Cole, Alexander Fraser, G. Le Meseurier, Henry Symmes, H. M. O'Reilly, J. W. Cadham, Niagara Falls, Ont.; Geo. S. Macklem, Chippawa; A. C. Macdonell, Toronto; Dr. Charles Murray, Toronto; David Innes, Niagara Falls, N.Y.; and Dr. James A. Lanigan, Niagara Falls, N.Y. Letters of regret were received from Premier Hardy, Hon. Mr. Hart, Hon. Mr. Harcourt, Rev. Canon Bull, of Niagara Falls South; Rev. Canon Houston, Niagara Falls; James Battle, Mayor of Thorold; W. B. Rankin, manager of the Power Company, Niagara Falls, N.Y., and a number of other gentlemen.

The Hospice of Mount Carmel is intended as a retreat for pilgrims and members both of the laity and Church who wish to retire from the world for a short period, and rest and meditate upon religious subjects. It is said that it is the only hospice in Canada where all classes can be received, but it was specially built with this intention, and has accommodation for some fifty guests.

The Fathers have certainly chosen a very charming spot upon which to erect their hospice. The house stands on an elevation overlooking the falls, and from it can be seen some of the grandest scenery around Niagara. It is surrounded by one hundred acres of land, the property of the Order of Mount Carmel, and is on the line of the Michigan Central railway. The old monastery, which for so many years has served the Fathers of Mount Carmel, will now be torn down, and when it is removed it will still further improve the view of the falls from the hospice. The extensive grounds afford the ample accommodation required for the thousands of those who make pilgrimages to the shrine.

**THE WORK THAT WAS DONE.**  
A walk through the building gave the visitors a good idea of how thoroughly carried out was the work planned by the Carmelite Fathers. The building is a large massive structure, built of Queenston sandstone, the architecture being of the Lombard-Roman style, perfectly carried out. The carving of the pillars gives a very handsome appearance to the building, and there are no less than 250 pieces of this carving. The interior fittings of the hospice while plain are in excellent taste. The building is finished in red and quartered oak. The bedrooms for the use of guests while in retreat are most comfortably furnished, and on each floor there are two bathrooms. On the eastern side of the building, on the ground floor, is an open granite arcade from which outdoor Mass is celebrated on the occasions of pilgrimages. The dining-room, too, a very large and lofty room, is also on the lower floor.

At the main staircase there is a large stained glass window, representing Our Lady of Mount Carmel, and another stained glass window on the second

floor shows two saints of the order and the execution. On the second floor are the bedrooms of the guests and a large sitting-room opening up upon a broad and shady verandah. According to the rules of the order guests while in retreat may not speak to each other while in the hospice, with the exception of when they are gathered together in the sitting room. On this floor, too, is a temporary chapel, which will be utilized until the new church, which is proposed to be constructed, shall have been completed. On the upper floor a billiard room for the use of guests is to be fitted up. Another large compartment there may eventually contain a printing press, for the Order of Our Lady of Mount Carmel issues its own publications.

The Fathers of the hospice may claim the credit of being the first to put to its full use the electric power now at the disposal of Niagara Falls on the Canadian side of the river. The hospice has not a chimney in it. There is no occasion for one, as no fires are required, the building being heated entirely by electricity. Movable electric radiators are in all the rooms and in the corridor, and all that needs to be done to make the attachment between the radiator and the wire is to turn on the electricity and develop electric heat. These radiators are so arranged also that the heat from each can be regulated. The Fathers, by the way, manufacture their own radiators. The parts are imported from the United States and put together in the workshop of the hospice.

**COOKING BY ELECTRICITY.**

It is in the culinary department that the uses of electricity have been developed to their fullest extent. All the cooking is done by electricity. There are electric chafin dishes, tea and coffee-buffers, plate-warmers, ovens, toasters, and the like, all of which are operated by electricity. So that a stove is at no time required. The Hospice of Mount Carmel is said to be the only institution on the continent where such a system is in successful operation. The electrical apparatus was devised and installed by Mr. August Hart, of Newark, New Jersey. The power is obtained from the Canadian Power Company, which supplies the hospice with 25 horse-power in summer and 100 horse-power in winter. The waterworks system of the Falls can also be operated by electricity when required.

Large as it is the present hospice is but one portion of the magnificent structure which the Fathers of Mount Carmel propose to erect. Another wing, similar in construction to the hospice, is to be erected as a monastery, and in the center of the building and extending easterly 110 feet will be the church. The present building was designed by H. A. Mosser, of Pittsburgh, called the Dean of American Architects, and plans are prepared for the other buildings, some of the material being already on the ground.

The dinner tendered to visitors to-day was a pleasantly informal affair. Rev. Father Kredt officiated as chairman, with Rev. Father T. J. McDonnell, O.C.C., Superior of the Monastery, in the vice-chair. The members of the order present were: Father J. C. Feenan, O.C.C., Niagara Falls; Father Brennan, O.C.C., Niagara-on-the-Lake; Father D. F. Best, O.C.C.; Father Francis Krebs, O.C.C.; Father Benedict O'Neill, O.C.C., of the Monastery; the dining-room being prettily draped in hunting, and on the wall at the head of the table were the British and American flags intertwined. The toast list was a short one, the first toast being the health of the Queen, and Pope Leo XIII. To the toast of the clergy Rev. Canon Mackenzie and Rev. John Crayford made happy replies, congratulating the Fathers of Mount Carmel upon the completion of the building and wishing the hospice success and prosperity in the good work that it was destined to do. Other toasts were the Dominion, read by Father McDonnell; the Provincial Legislature, replied to by Mr. German, M.P.P.; our American cousins, responded to by Mr. A. C. Hastings, Mayor of Niagara Falls, N.Y.; and Dr. Lanigan, of Niagara Falls, N.Y.; our municipal institutions, replied to by W. P. Slater, Mayor of Niagara Falls, Ont., and T. Berriman, Reeve of Stamford. The health of the Hospice of Mount Carmel was proposed by Mr. German, and responded to by Father Kredt, who explained the object for which the hospice had been erected.
