sactions are reported in square and waney timber, although several deals are said to be pending for the coming winter's output. GREAT BRITAIN.

A somewhat pessimistic article appears in one of the British timber trade.journals pointing out the fallacy of expecting that the proposed curtailment of the log crop in Norway and Sweden this winter will benefit lumber prices during the early part of next year. It is shown that the logs cut this winter will not reach the mills until the middle of next year, and many of them not until the following season. The first-open-water shipments will be the product of logs now at the mills. While these statements are doubtless correct, the fact remains that if a limited quantity of logs is cut this winter, there must be a corresponding decrease eventually in the quantity of lumber to supply the demand. This is the view taken by the trade generally, and it has inspired a degree of confidence. Speculators have entered the market, believing that purchases made at present prices will show a good profit next year. It is not expected that active buying will commence until towards the close of the year. White pine of best quality is in excellent demand, very little of this class being offered at auction sales. Spruce is also firm. A Liverpool importer is offering £7 per standard c.i.f. for a cargo from Nouve'le, Que. Buying is advised wherever suitable specifications can be obtained. A few lots of 12 feet x 3 x 9 inch first quality spruce, from Quebec, was recently, sold in London at L12 per standard. In timber the market is quiet excepting in the case of oak, which is advancing in price owing to the light import.

UNITED, STATES.

The log crop of the coming winter is one of the factors tending to strengthen the white pine market. It is estimated that the cost of taking out logs in the Minneapolis district will be 50 per cent. above normal, and that the supply for the Minneapolis mills will be lessened at least 100,000 feet by this cause. The scarcity and high cost of labor is the great difficulty. Reports of satisfactory trade come from the Lake Superior district and from the eastern distributing points

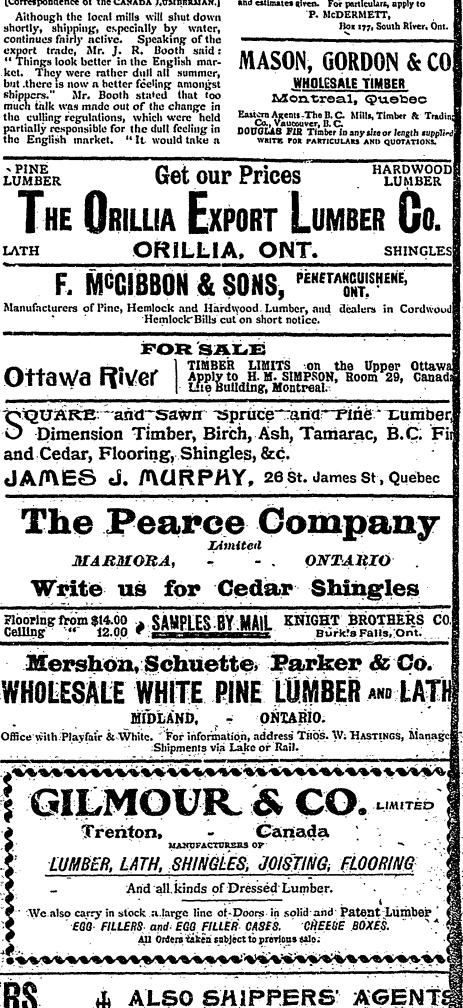
