KING OF ISRAEL AND JUDAH.

THOUGH the most recent work by the author of *PIZZA A DAY*, *LEVIN TRUST LIVES*, and many other books for children. Like all the other volumes of the series this publication is very much suited to interest little children, and gives them a good idea of the part of Scripture as native indicated in the title. The former volumes have had an enormous circulation, and we have no doubt this also will be very widely read.

DATEMAN'S HYMN.

Perhaps no collection of hymns has had any thing like so large an amount of popularity as the Little one by the Rev. C. H. Bateman. Originally published twenty-seven years ago, and then comprising twenty-four hymns, it has been gradually enlarged till now this little edition, almost a month or two ago, comprised 200 of the most popular hymns with music adapted for Sabbath School and family use. The collection has been circulated by millions, and is in preparation for a new edition. The hymns in this form it will lose none of the popularity. It is a book of a kind of downiness, costing only five cents, and containing the music. An edition with the four parts and an accompaniment for the piano and organ will be published, and in preparation, which will be exceedingly acceptable. The children will be specially pleased, and so large an addition of very beautiful melodies made to their favorite hymn book.

WHY WOMEN CANNOT BE SAVED IN.

This is the title of a very clever pamphlet written, it is understood, by a very talented and accomplished married lady, on the north side of the Tweed, and published by the Means. Blackwood, Edinburgh.

In opposition to the advocates of women's rights, as at present generally understood, she endeavours to show that argue as one may, a woman cannot be brought to do men's work, or, in other words, become men. They have different spheres, and do what one likes, the arrangements of Providence in this respect cannot be set aside. For instance, in the following passage, she shows that women have all along been deficient in inventiveness:—

From this and other considerations, the conclusion is as follows:—

"I am consumed, I starve, and excrete alone;
 when the flesh becomes one of mere ro-
 tteness—provided always that excretion is not
 suspended—he gives it over to the woman.
 It is an external life. He goes out to life;
 must come into her. He seeks for know-
 ledge and its sources, earns it, fights for it,
 and it with hunger and wounds. Knowledge
 brought to her second-hand, ready-made, and
 takes it patiently. Little doubting of the
 other's place and the richer hues that it had
 when you wore it thriced by thread and wore
 its first freshness. He builds up know-
 ledge by stone; she sees the structure,
 has never witnessed the laying of the founda-
 tion."

This woman have attained considerable skill and dexterity in manual employments, and experience shows that wherever absolute justice is indispensable their services are not obtainable. This also accounts for it in the following fashion :—

This is partly due to the greater delicacy of the nervous system, which unfits them for attention involved in accurate operations. Although women can perform efficiently the duties of telegraph clerks by day, they cannot turn the same duties by night, and have to attend some home duties by night.

vous system gets so disturbed that they are not equal to the task for which they suffer by day. As men do not become affected in the same way, it would indicate that they are insulated to the extent that they are not in contact with the system for the same reason as the women are. However, women are unqualified by their submitted confessions for anything coming before a court.

It would seem very terrible, that this should be said by an accomplished woman in reference to her own sex. The great question, however, must even be. Is it correct? And about that we fear there can be but little doubt. There is nothing said but in the gentlest, kindest fashion. She does not propose a remedy for the present and growing evil connected with the comparative paucity of openings for women to earn a livelihood. The very improvements and innovations of modern times she acknowledges have borne hard upon them. Many of the occupations of former days are not now available:—

"With these have gone their carnage and their past time, and, hardest of all for women, these were the only avocations that could be carried on beside the hearth. Concurrently with these changes, others have been going on in Great Britain still more terrible to women's happiness and welfare. A great disparity has come about in the numbers of the sexes, leaving the women in a large majority, and this proportion is further increased by the opening up of our colonies, which draw away so many of our male population."

This is not so much felt in Canada as in Britain, though the same difficulty is met with here. A large portion of our middle-class women are in Canada even in danger of becoming helplessly idle, and how can they help it? No doubt there is truth in the following remarks of this writer on marriage being the true mission of women, and all cannot get married:—
