Sheepskins are bought at 80c for good lots of green; country lots at 65c and 70c, according to quality. Calfskins entirely unchanged and quiet. Leather is moving in small lots to country buyers. There is no change in prices.

Hoss.—Trade has been active for the past two weeks. Prices are affected by the low markets in the States. Buyers here are steadily guarded. Prices are steady at about \$5.50 to \$5.75 for car-lots according to condition-Present aspect of the market is against any prospect of advance.

Phovisions, &c.—The local market is unchanged. Supplies are abundant. There is very little demand outside of local requirements. Prices are generally unchanged and easy. Bucon is quoted in light demand, at &c for car lots and \$\frac{3}{2}c\$ for boxed lots. Cumberland cut \$\frac{7}{2}c\$ and \$\frac{8}{2}c\$ for boxed lots. Cumberland cut \$\frac{7}{2}c\$ and \$\frac{8}{2}c\$. Hums quiet at \$\frac{9}{3}c\$ for pickled and 11c for smoked. Lard quiet at 10c to 11c, according to quality. Butter dull, best tub quoted at 17c to 18c, and large rolls at 13c to 14c. Polatoes unchanged, but receipts delayed at 38c to 40c per lag car lots. Hops dull, small lots selling at 12c to 17c, according to quality. Pressed Hun quoted at \$\frac{8}{2}t\$ in ear lots, and for good quality of Timothy. Poultry in large supply, and prices steady, box lots bringing \$c\$ for geese, \$c\$ to 9c for ducks, 12c to 14c for turkeys.

The Mobile Moccasin .- For a long walk in the snow there is no covering for the foot equal to the moccasin in point of lightness, "holding" quality and comfort. The best article of the kind we have yet had under notice is the invention of Mr. G. Boivin, wholesale boot and shoe manufacturer, of 40 and 42 Jacques Cartier Square, Montreal. Those who have worn the old-fashioned moccasin will see its advantages at a glance. The old-fashioned moccasin was tied with a leather thong, which, if tied loosely, was liable to untie itself, and if tied tightly cut the ankle, while the front, coming together with a flap, always allowed the snow to work in and, melting, wet the sock. In Mr. Boivin's ingenious shoe the flap is behind, where there is less exposure, and it is brought together by a leather band, which passes through a tight-litting slot in front, and is held by a buckle similar to a suspender fustener. There is therefore no opening where the snow will drift in, and this is further provided against by a canvas braid on the upper edge of the shoe, which prevents the leather from stretching and sagging if wet. The shoes were put upon the market about two years ago, and already have a large sale in Omario as well as in the other Provinces.

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
